Mrs. Cora Belle Hines, of Hubersburg, died yesterday morning, September 2, 1942, at the Centre County Home, where she had been a patient since August 29, this year. Death was attributed to a complication of diseases. Mrs. Hines was a daughter of David M. and Isabelle Mayes Whitman and was born at Curtin on November 19, 1862, making her age at time of death 79 years, 9 months and 10 days. MEN UNDER 50 YEARS MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR RESERVES

Men under 50 years of age who were honorably discharged from the Navy within the last 10 years may now enlist in the U. S. Naval Reserve at ratings above those they held at the time of their discharge, the Navy Recruiting Office here announced today.

Designed to bring experienced men back into the fleet, the new ruling would permit a physically qualified man who had been discharged as a machinist's mate second class, for example, to re-enlist as a machinist's mate first class or better.

All men honorably discharged between July 1, 1932, and December 6, 1941, and who were recommended for re-enlistment, are eligible for higher ratings under the revised plan, the Recruiting Office said. The candidate need not have followed his Navy trade in civilian life since his discharge to be eligible.

County Firemen Attend School

(Continued from page one) The firemen heard Dr. David J. Price, a College alumnus and newly-elected president of the National Fire Protection Association, warn at last night's opening assembly that fire is a major weapon of modern warfare, and that "it is necessary to provide more than guards, watchmen, and wire fences to prevent losses from explosions and fires where common knowledge of fire prevention has not been applied in a practical manner." He told the firemen that "we cannot relax for a moment our vigilance against fires, our care of the equipment we now have, or our efforts to learn to use that existing equipment at new high levels of efficiency." Dr. Hubert C. Eicher, chief of the School Plant Division, State Department of Public Instruction, also spoke at last night's session, reporting that Pennsylvania loses one of its 11,000 school plants every week through fire and calling upon community fire-fighters to do their utmost to keep the schools "open for the duration." He warned that wartime fire hazards represent a challenge to the efficiency of America's fire-fighting forces.

Dr. Hubley R. Owen, director of the Department of Health at Philadelphia, and Robert F. Hamm, assistant director of education in the State Fire Marshal's Office at Indianapolis, Indiana, will be the principal speakers at tonight's assembly. Amos E. Neyhart, administrative head of the College Institute of Public Safety, will speak at the Friday night assembly.

State College, Bellefonte and Lewistown fire equipment has been made available to the school for its outdoor demonstrations and these units are active daily on the campus. Friday afternoon, the United States Army Chemical Warfare Service at Edgewood Arsenal will send a special unit to demonstrate how to handle phosphorus and other bombs utilized in modern warfare. These demonstrations are scheduled for the "proving ground" on the campus.
