SOLVE GAS PROBLEM An electric spark photographic "squeeze" more automobile been developed by Samuel Gilman,

30-year-old research engineer of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufac-

turing Company Gilman calls the device a spray analyzer and says it "stops" flying water droplets one-thirtieth as big as the head of a pin. These droplets photographed, Gilman said, adding

"New automobile carburetors giving more miles per gallon may result from studies made with this apparatus. By using it, automotive engineers will be able to determine the exact size of gasoline droplets in the carburetor-and the fineness of the droplets influences the rate at which the fuel vaporizes. They will also be able to find out whether the spray is uniformly distributed."


