

OBITUARY

MRS. MARY C. KRUG

Mrs. Mary C. Krug, mother of Dr. E. S. Krug, of 226 East Nittany avenue, State College, died at Dr. Krug's home at 11:15 o'clock Monday morning, September 14, 1942, of heart disease. She was 59. Born May 4, 1883, in Williamsport, she was a daughter of Henry and Lydia Eason Sents. She was married to Edgar M. Krug, who died in 1930. She is survived by her father, one son, Dr. Krug, and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Ralph J. Lowder and Mrs. Lola B. Glenn, State College; Mrs. William Stevens, Pine Grove Mills; Henry Sents, Curtin, and James Sents, Milesburg. She was a member of the McConnellsburg Methodist church. She was editor of the Fulton County News for a number of years after her husband's death and was an active clubwoman and church worker. For years Mrs. Krug was active in civic affairs in McConnellsburg and Hunt-ington. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a. m. Thursday at the Koch funeral home, State College, in charge of Rev. E. H. Jones, pastor of the State College Presbyterian church. Interment will be in Pine Hall cemetery.

DAVID D. MASON

David D. Mason, well known State College resident and for 24 years a teacher of French at Penn State, died unexpectedly Sunday morning, September 13, 1942, shortly after he suffered an apoplectic stroke at his home. He was 47. Mr. Mason, who had been directing motion picture production in the College Extension Services since June, 1941, had been in apparent good health until the time of his death. He passed away while being brought to the Centre County Hospital in the Alpha Fire Company community ambulance. David Dudley Mason was born December 19, 1894, in Wilkes-Barre, a son of Dr. J. J. and Glencora Nicholas Mason. He was graduated from the College in 1917 with the degree of bachelor of arts, and later received his master's degree at the same place. He was on leave of absence as an associate professor of French while working for the Extension Services. During the time he was instructor in French, Mr. Mason was also dramatic coach of the Penn State Players for approximately ten years. He was a member of Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honorary, Phi Sigma Iota, language honorary, and Theta Alpha Phi, national dramatics society. He was also a member of the First Baptist church of Wilkes-Barre. Mr. Mason was married November 28, 1930, to Leda Elizabeth Baldwin of Erie, who survives with two small

children, Mary Esther and Leda Pauline. Two brothers, Robert C. of Wilkes-Barre, and J. Gordon, formerly of Wilkes-Barre and now of Camp Claiborne, La., also survive. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at St. Andrew's Episcopal church, State College, with Rev. E. M. Frear officiating and Rev. Herbert Koepf-Baker assisting. Interment was made in Pine Hall cemetery.

AMMON ALLEN STOVER

Ammon Allen Stover, retired farmer, died at his home in Aaronsburg, Pa., at 6:15 o'clock Monday evening, September 14, 1942, of complications. Mr. Stover, who had been in poor health for some time, was a son of Andrew J. and Annie Stover and was born in Haines township on September 11, 1867, making his age at time of death 75 years and 3 days. Surviving are his wife, the former Minnie O. Stover; these children, Henry J. of Aaronsburg, R. D.; Mrs. Harry Bower and Mrs. Carrie Belle Durst, both of Aaronsburg; Mrs. Styril Frazier, of Akron, Ohio; and Andrew William Stover, of Williamsport. Other survivors include a brother, Warren F. of Millheim, and a step-brother, Martin A. of Centre Hall. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock this Thursday afternoon with Rev. O. E. Feeman officiating. Interment will be made in the Salem Lutheran church of Aaronsburg.

DAVID FRANK LEEDER

Just as he was about to begin his first day's work for the Producers Economy Coal Company of Karthaus, David Frank Leeder dropped dead last Thursday, September 10, 1942, at the company's mine at Karthaus. Mr. Leeder, a coal miner by occupation had been an asthma sufferer for years but had reported for work shortly before he died at 7:30 a. m. The deceased, who had lived in Moshannon for 57 years, was born at Middleburg, August 18, 1876, a son of John and Harriet Whittimyer Leeder. He was aged 66 years and 4 days. His wife, the former Anna Williamson, and two daughters, Mrs. John Tubridy of Fairport, N. Y., and Mrs. Ray Watson of Moshannon, survive. One half-brother, Charles Spanier of Lewisburg, five grandchildren, also survive. He was affiliated with the Methodist church. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Moshannon Methodist church, with Rev. Ralph D. Schlabig officiating. Interment was made in Askey cemetery, near Moshannon.

MRS. FRANCIS S. BOWEN

Mrs. Ella Anne Bowen, wife of Francis S. Bowen, died at 9:30 o'clock Monday morning, September 14, 1942, at her home in Walker township where she had resided for 13 years since coming to Centre county from Bedford county. Mrs. Bowen was a daughter of John and Margaret Moore Leonard and was born at Everett on April 9, 1865, making her age at time of death 77 years, 6 months, and 5 days. She was a member of the Church of Christ. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 o'clock this Thursday morning at the home, with the Rev. Frank Long, of Mill Hall, officiating. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

GEORGE H. OWENS

George H. Owens, a limestone worker for 17 years died at 1:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, September 13, 1942, at the Dr. Teah Private Hospital, Lock Haven, of complications following an illness of several weeks' duration. Mr. Owens, who lived in Buffalo Run Valley, had been a patient in the hospital for three weeks. The deceased had been employed for 17 years as a hydrator operator for the former Chemical Limestone Company, now the National Gypsum Company in Buffalo Run Valley. He worked until about three weeks ago. George H. Owens was a son of William and Cora E. Roan Owens and was born at Axemann on October 19, 1907, making his age at time of death 34 years, 10 months and 24 days. His wife, the former Catherine Hovan, and an adopted daughter, Helen Jean, at home, survive, in addition to his father living in Vicksburg. Jerry and Joseph Owens of near Zion, Mrs. Newton Winegard of Spring Mills, and Mrs. Wirman Warner of Axemann, are surviving brothers and sisters. Anna Marie Owens of Vicksburg, is a surviving half-sister. He was a member of Logan Grange, No. 109, of Pleasant Gap. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at Myers United Brethren church in Buffalo Run Valley. Interment was made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

NEW DEVICE MAY SOLVE GAS PROBLEM

An electric spark photographic device which the inventor says may help "squeeze" more automobile miles out of a gallon of gasoline has been developed by Samuel Gilman, 36-year-old research engineer of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company. Gilman calls the device a spray analyzer and says it "stops" flying water droplets one-thirtieth as big as the head of a pin. These droplets are easily photographed, Gilman said, adding: "New automobile carburetors giving more miles per gallon may result from studies made with this apparatus. By using it, automotive engineers will be able to determine the exact size of gasoline droplets in the carburetor—and the fineness of the droplets influences the rate at which the fuel vaporizes. They will also be able to find out whether the spray is uniformly distributed."
