County Paralysis Group Organizes

16 Units Established to Speed Reports on New or Old Cases of Malady

The Centre County Chapter for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis held its second annual dinner, Monday evening at the Brockerhoff Hotel. Election of officers resulted as follows:

An aviator must have certain definite physical and mental capacities. His job calls for agile exercises of his intellect, unflinching will power, a high degree of development of reflex and muscular control and perfect coordination.

Above all, he must have complete control of his emotions.

He must be on the alert every instant. In the first days of the first World War, England estimated that 90 per cent of her aviation casualties resulted from the individual deficiencies of her piloting personnel.

Extreme care is now taken to eliminate those candidates for flying who can not measure up to the difficult standards.

First comes a very thorough physical examination.

Then there is a complete and painstaking neuropsychiatric examination to reject mental and nervous failures.

Psychological tests, both subjective and objective, will indicate which men have native flying ability.

It is by a combination of body, nerve and mind examination that the applicant's potentialities can be determined.

Correct evaluation looms high in the armamentarium of the flight surgeon.

Military aviators have to be well high perfect, physically, mentally and emotionally.

Such perfection keeps 'em flying! DO YOU KNOW Every American soldier going into a theater of operation is provided with a shaker-tot package of sulfanilamide crystals to be sprinkled over possible wounds and thus aid in prevention of infection while awaiting proper medical care. Also, he will carry twelve sulfanilamide tablets for internal use.
