All Trucks Must Have Certificate

Registration Days Announced For October 22, 23 and 24 After November 15, in order to operate, it will be necessary for all commercial vehicles, including farm trucks, to possess a Certificate of War Necessity. Forms for applying for these certificates have been, or now are, being mailed to all truck operators by the Office of Defense Transportation. In order to assist owners of farm trucks to fill in these applications, the County Farm Transportation Committee, recently appointed by the USDA County War Board, is making plans for National Farm Truck Registration Days, October 22, 23, and 24, when volunteer workers will be on hand to assist farmers. Farmers are requested to bring their trucks, on these days, the application form which was mailed to them and all information which will assist in determining the number of miles, number of trips, and the tonnage of each load for 1941 and 1942. The committee has emphasized that no Certificate of War Necessity can be issued by ODT until the application has been received. In addition, all applications must reach the central office of ODT at Detroit before November 1. The committee announced that it is not required of farmers to file applications with the committee on these registration days. They may apply directly to the central ODT office at Detroit, according to instructions accompanying each application. However, computing some of the information for the applications is rather difficult, and the farm transportation committee was set up to provide assistance to those who wish it. In case any operators of farm trucks have not received their application forms by October 22, they should immediately notify the county farm transportation committee, whose headquarters is located in the office of the Agricultural Conservation Committee, Bellefonte Trust Company, Bellefonte. The telephone number is 2447. The new transportation program aims to confine truck operations to those that are necessary to the war effort or to the essential domestic economy and to make the most use possible of each vehicle. One point the committee emphasized is that without a certificate, a truck cannot be operated lawfully, nor obtain a gasoline rationing permit, tires (if eligible), nor repair parts. ADMIRALS, 2 GENERALS, 55 FLIERS LOST BY JAPNS Heavy Japanese losses of top ranking army and navy commanders in the opening months of the war in the Pacific were disclosed belatedly in a Tokyo broadcast of posthumous awards of the Order of the Golden Kite, Japan's highest military decoration. A vice admiral, two rear admirals and two major generals were among thousands honored after death in connection with a current extraordinary national festival of enshrining the souls at Yasukuni Shrine. The Order of the Golden Kite alone—and many other orders were conferred—went posthumously to 95 Japanese army and navy officers and men for their actions in the Pacific war, and to 3,031 others for services in China. Also awarded the Order of the Golden Kite were 55 naval aviators and nine "members of a special attack flotilla"—presumably "suicide submarines who took part in the attack on Pearl Harbor.

CURFEW REGULATES WARTIME STUDY AT PENN STATE More than 6,000 students at the Pennsylvania State College have adopted a wartime study program by observing an 8:30 p. m. activities curfew which sends them back to their books early every Sunday through Thursday night. Curtailment of student activities was enacted by the student governing body, All-College Cabinet, when it forbade any meetings on campus after the curfew. Jerome H. Blakeslee, Erie, appointed a special committee to hear cases for special late permissions and to prosecute violators. In order to ease the burden of "loaded weekends," the cabinet also combined the annual Junior Prom and Senior Ball dances. The student president also appealed to students to eliminate activities over which student government has no control and to cut down whenever possible.

BARNESBORO DOCTOR CITED FOR AUTO RATION FRAUD Dr. E. T. Ealy, 67-year-old Barnesboro (Cambria county) physician, is charged by the office of price administration with giving a false statement to a rationing board in an attempt to obtain a new automobile when the OPA declared, he already owned three. A complaint filed by Louis G. Feldman, chief investigator for the OPA in western Pennsylvania, charged that Dr. Ealy told the Everette (Bedford county) board in a purchase application March 24, that he had not made any other application to another board. Actually, the complaint charged, Dr. Ealy had applied to the board at Barnesboro on March 12 and had been turned down.

PENN STATE ELEVEN HOME AGAINST COLGATE Penn State's football Lions return home this Saturday after two weeks on the road, battling the powerful Colgate Red Raiders on Beaver Field, in what should be one of the most important gridiron engagements of the week in the East. With engagements against Bucknell, Lehigh and Cornell behind them, Coach Bob Higgins' Nittany gridmen will be seeking to avenge a 1941 defeat at the hands of Andy Carter's Colgate team as well as to stop the Colgate eleven which is touted as one of the East's powers this fall. Last year, the two teams clashed at Buffalo, N. Y., and the raiders squeezed a 7-0 triumph over the Higginsmen, in what was a terrific battle all the way. Previous to that meeting, the two schools had battled four times, with the Lions showing only one victory, an 18-4 success in 1911 when the teams first met. In 1930, 1931 and 1932, the Raiders smashed State easily by large scores. Both the Lions and Raiders will present teams Saturday which are well-equipped with star running backs and powerful lines. Sparky Brown, Bob Weitzel, Jack Banbury, Larry Joe and the Nittany ball-carriers will match the abilities of Ed Phinney, Al Hanover, Bill Fox and Mike Micka of Colgate.

HESS' WIFE IS SEEKING TO JOIN HER HUSBAND Frau Ilse Hess, wife of the one-time deputy fuhrer of Nazi Germany, Rudolf Hess, wants to join her husband in his British internment, a report that reached the British House of Commons stated. William Thorne, Laborite, gave notice he would ask Anthony Eden, foreign secretary, "what reply is being made to the request of Frau Hess, wife of Rudolf Hess who is now somewhere in England, for permission to join her husband." The question did not state where Frau Hess is now living. "Very little is known of Frau Hess' movements since her husband left Germany in a Messerschmitt fighting plane May 10, 1941, and landed in Scotland, presumably in an effort to negotiate a peace between Britain and Germany, or to invite Britain to join in a war on Russia. She was seen in Berlin a week after Hess left. "A brunette, mannishly-dressed woman, she always shunned the society events which attracted the wives of other leaders in the Nazi hierarchy and spent much time in her Munich home, caring for her only child, five year old Ruediger Hess."

WINTER SHORT COURSES OFFERED AT PENN STATE Several short courses which fit into the wartime program will be offered during the next few months by the School of Agriculture at the Pennsylvania State College. Professor A. L. Beam, director of the agricultural short courses, has announced. As an aid to the shortage of labor prevalent in dairy plants, the college will give three courses in dairy manufacturing. It was announced. The courses are: testing milk and dairy products, November 30 to December 5; market milk and milk control, December 7 to 19; and ice cream making, January 4 to 16. Dr. C. D. Dahle, in charge of the dairy courses, said that much of the work performed in modern dairy plants can be done by women and girls, and the training in these short courses will prepare the women for semi-technical positions. Whether the regular winter short courses in general agriculture, dairy farming, and animal husbandry will be offered this year will depend upon the demand, Professor Beam indicated. Descriptive material is available on these courses, Professor Beam said, and prospective students are urged to register as far in advance as possible. Not every teacher is a teacher.
