Rabbits, Squirrels Get Break, Hunters Reported Scarce

Looks as though its going to be a happy fall for the rabbits, squirrels, pheasants and other small game in Centre County, for up until yesterday only about half the usual number of hunting licenses had been sold. The season opens Saturday morning of next week. The chief reason small game is getting a break is because hundreds of young men who normally go out to shoot rabbits this time of the year are out shooting Japs and Nazis. Other reasons for the predicted scarcity of hunters include the fact that nearly every person able to be around is employed, and anyhow ammunition, rifles and other accoutrements of the hunt are scarce. The materials are needed for the war effort. No accurate check of the number of licenses sold is available, for they are sold at various state appointed agencies through the county. At the Treasurer's office only 400 have been issued, which is far below the normal number at this time of the year. If you're going out the first day remember that hunting is prohibited before 9 a. m. After the first day hunting is permissible from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.

Howard Thompson Well Qualified

Born in Curwensville, the public schools of that town supplied his education. Early in life he entered the business world and has wide experience in many various fields of private and public enterprise. Mr. Thompson embarked on his career in Philadelphia, where he was associated with an electrical manufacturing company. His interest in this field led him back to Clearfield in 1920 to work with Mr. A. W. Lee in revamping electrical service in that county. Later, he was supervisor over the same type of work at Philadelphia.

Ten years followed at Bellefonte, during which time the Democratic nominee constructed power plants at Milesburg and Millersburg. In 1922 Mr. Thompson terminated his work in the electrical field to devote his time to the motion picture industry. His circuit, the Mid-State Theatres, has units at Clearfield, Bellefonte, Curwensville, Houtzdale, Coalport, Madera, Stoneboro, Watsonstown, and Montgomery, Pa.

In addition to this effort through the years since 1922 successful ventures have taken place in coal mines, hosiery mills, water companies, banking, and other industries throughout the 34th District. The candidate is not without ingenuity. In 1907 when the electric light plant in Clearfield blew up and the town was without power or lights, Mr. Thompson arranged for three locomotives to be brought from Altoona. Their boilers supplied steam until the new plant was ready.

Mr. Thompson's residence throughout the entire district and his wide business contacts with the people of the district he seeks to represent have given him an intimate knowledge of the problems here at home. The candidate is a large taxpayer and as such, is qualified to give tax matters proper consideration, both from the standpoint of citizen and business man. As a life-long Democrat, public and civic affairs have always interested the senatorial nominee. For 12 years he was a member of the Board of Trustees of the Huntingdon Industrial School. He has served on the Board of Directors of the Clearfield Memorial Hospital and has been instrumental in bringing industries to communities where he worked and lived.

Airplane Mechanic



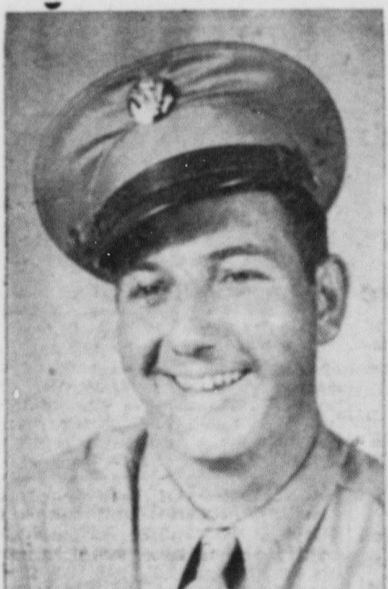

Training In Infantry



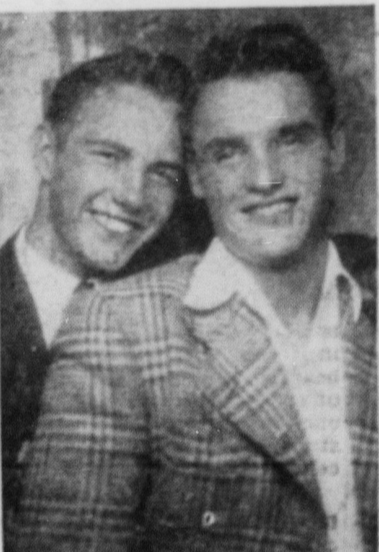
