Urges Defeat of GOP Legislators

(Continued from page one) failure to see what we all see now—and most of us saw then—failure to see what ought to have been clear as a bell to any man not blinded and hoodwinked by partisan politics or hatred of the President, or both.
Pinchot, who twice defeated the regular Republican organization to win the Governorship, spoke over station KYW.
'Melancholy Record' He looked at what he called "the melancholy record" to draw up his indictment against incumbent Republican Congressmen who seek reelection in November.
'Before Pearl Harbor,' he said, 'Republicans in the House voted overwhelmingly against practically every bill intended to strengthen us for the struggle that was so clearly coming.'
And Pennsylvania GOP Congressmen, he pointed out, voted against such measures as lifting the arms embargo, lend-lease and extending the service of draftees by a 12-to-1 ratio while the average Republican vote in the House was only 5 to 1 against.
'Misrepresented People' "Either these men could not see the situation, or they would not see it," he said. "Either they were blind or they were blinders."
"Remember this! If Republicans should win control of the next House, their leaders will be the same men under whom they voted overwhelmingly against lend-lease, against conscription, and against other measures that we all know are the very foundations of winning the war.
"Remember that Roosevelt was elected Franklin D. Roosevelt our commander-in-chief by a huge majority. That being so, do you think it would be a good thing to turn our backs on the commander-in-chief by electing a politically hostile House? If we should advertise to the world that we in Pennsylvania have lost confidence in our leader, do you think it would encourage our Allies? Or would it bring encouragement to Hitler and the Japs?
"I have only two things to urge upon you. First—vote. Second—use your vote to win the war. Vote against the men who would have crippled America in the war if they had had their way."
