John Lester Bechtol, 27, third son of Mr. and Mrs. Bechtol, is a graduate of East Penns Valley High School, class of '31. He enlisted in the U. S. Army December 30, 1925, and was sent to Fort Slocum, N. Y., for six weeks' training. From there he was sent to Fort Hancock, N. J., and remained until the last nine months of his enlistment which was spent in California. He returned home January 3, 1929. On July 24th of the same year he re-enlisted and

was sent to Fort Hancock, N. J., where he was stationed until Oct. 2, 1940, when he sailed for Ft. Amador, Canal Zone, his present station. During his last enlistment he was promoted to Corporal.

Kenneth E. Bechtol, 20, the second brother to enlist, entered the service November 30, 1940, at the age of 18. He also is a graduate of the East Penns Valley High School. After his enlistment he was sent to Maxwell Field, Ala., where he remained for some time and was then sent to Lowry Field, Colo., to a mechanical school for a 13-week period. Jackson, Miss., where he was stationed until January 20th when he left for foreign service in Australia, his present location. Kenneth reached the Corporal rating in his first year of service. He is a member of the Air Corps.

Harold E. Bechtol, 25, the fourth son of Mr. and Mrs. Bechtol and the third brother to enlist, entered the U. S. Air Corps January 6, 1942. He was sent to Wichita, Texas, where he spent three weeks. From Texas he was transferred to Orlando Air Base, Fla., where he spent six months, and at present is located at Municipal Airport, S. C.

BHS Loses To Huntingdon High

Attempted Comeback in Second Half Fails; Locals Suffer 33 to 6 Defeat

A razzle-dazzle second-half in an attempted comeback failed for Bellefonte in its game against Huntingdon High last Friday night at Huntingdon, and the final score was 33 to 6 in favor of Huntingdon.

Huntingdon started its lightning game in the opening moments of the contest when it put forth a strong touchdown drive, with fullback Shaeffer setting the pace. It was the same Shaeffer who at the beginning of the second quarter went 93 yards for Huntingdon's third score. Huntingdon scored once more before half time and that was when Fluke ran about 38 yards for pay dirt. When the half ended Huntingdon had a 27-point lead and Bellefonte hadn't scored.

Bellefonte played excellent football in the second half, and backed up with a good reserve force, led Huntingdon have only one more touchdown for the rest of the game. That came in the third quarter when Jones intercepted a Davis pass intended for Pingue and tripped off 89 yards to cross the goal. The conversion failed.

Bellefonte's only touchdown came in the third quarter when Brooks, Bellefonte left end, blocked a kick which was recovered for Bellefonte by Bonchak, the big left tackle. In a matter of a few plays fullback Elmer Rocky took it over for a touchdown. A line rush failed for the extra point.

Nobody scored in the fourth quarter, and both teams were fairly well matched in that period.

5000 Bags of X-mas Packages Are Lost

A ship carrying 5000 bags of Christmas boxes to U. S. soldiers in foreign service recently was torpedoed in the North Atlantic, and consequently there may be no Santa Claus for a lot of Uncle Sam's soldiers unless other packages have better luck in reaching them.

Postmaster George R. Meek, of Bellefonte, in commenting upon the sinking of the mail ship, declared that to the best of his knowledge none of the packages lost had been mailed out of the Bellefonte post-office. Officials had reported that all of the packages lost had been received at New York prior to October 3, and Mr. Meek reports that practically no Christmas packages were received at the local office before about October 10.

The sinking of the ship, Mr. Meek said, serves to point out why it is necessary to mail Christmas packages to men overseas, early, and why those persons having relatives and friends in foreign service should not become unduly alarmed when they fail to hear from them as often or at such times as they think they should.

ANNIVERSARY SERVICES BEING WELL ATTENDED

For the first anniversary services in the Bellefonte Methodist church on Sunday the guest minister was the Rev. Willis W. Willard, pastor of the Columbia Avenue Methodist church in Tyrone.

Rev. Willard is a son of the local Methodist church and joined the Central Pennsylvania Conference in 1903. He preached an able and helpful sermon on the subject, "A Cloud of Witnesses." At the evening service, the local pastor, the Rev. H. C. Stenger, Jr., preached on the subject "Youth in the Church." This service was the anniversary of the youth work in the church.

On Monday evening, the Rev. H. Halbert Jacobs of the local Evangelical church, used as the subject of his sermon "The Home Church."

This service was in memory of the former pastors of the church now deceased, and in honor of the Rev. Alexander Scott, an aged retired minister who was unable to be present.

Mrs. E. E. McKelvey, widow of the Rev. E. E. McKelvey, was the special guest of the service. Mrs. Horace Lincoln Jacobs, the only other widow of former pastors was unable to attend because of her age.

On Tuesday evening, the Rev. H. Willis Hartsock, pastor from 1936 to 1941, preached on the subject, "Put on Thy Strength, O Zion." A very large audience attended the service and also the reception that followed for the Rev. and Mrs. Hartsock. He is now the pastor of the Methodist church in Everett.

Wednesday evening, the Rev. Homer C. Knox, pastor from 1925 to 1939, was the guest preacher. Following the service many people en-

joyed the reception that followed. This is the first time Rev. Knox has preached in Bellefonte since leaving in 1939. On Thursday evening, the Rev. E. R. Heckman, now superintendent of the Methodist Home for Aged in Tyrone, will be the guest preacher. Following that service there also will be a reception for the Rev. and Mrs. Heckman. The anniversary services will be completed on Sunday with the Rev. Elvin Clay Myers, the district superintendent, present to preach on the subject, "I Will Build My Church." The evening service will climax the program by a service planned especially for those who long have been members of the church.

I Know General Martin Is Honest -

In the recent Republican Party primary election campaign, I issued, without solicitation from anyone, a public statement in which I declared my intention to vote for United States Senator Davis for Governor. My reason, as I explained, was that I believed he would be a stronger candidate at the November election than his opponent, General Edward Martin.

A majority of the Republican voters who participated in the primary election nominated General Martin. As a loyal Republican, I unhesitatingly accepted the decision of the majority, and in line with this decision I shall vote for General Martin on Tuesday, next. Due to conditions over which I have no control, I had no thought of undertaking to do more than casting my ballot on election day.

However, in the last few days, the Democratic candidate for Governor has resorted to what I look upon as political trickery by questioning General Martin's personal honesty. To my mind, this is the lowest form of maneuvering to capture the votes of unsuspecting persons. I have not always approved of things General Martin has done in politics. This is well known among my friends. I do, however, most emphatically resent any attempt to question General Martin's personal honesty. I was in close touch with him at Harrisburg for four years. Without solicitation from anybody, I want to say to the people of Centre County that General Martin is rigidly honest. If I thought otherwise I would not vote for him. I do intend to vote for him because I am convinced beyond any question of doubt that he is honest, through and through.
