Chairman Henry A. Brookerhoff announced that the County Civilian Defense office on High street, Bellefonte, in which Monday night's meeting was held, will be moved next door in the near future. Aaron Lettitt of Bellefonte, head of county protective services, reported that an inspector from the Philadelphia Air Defense Wipg checked over the "black box" or warning post recently and said that the operation of the post, based on a 5-second check period, scored an average of 97.5 as against the state average of 95.8.

Patton schools closed Monday of last week when the district was unable to obtain a priority for a school bus for a new driver, after another driver had vacated the post.

Name Board To Presecute Violations

The Bellefonte Defense Council has appointed a board to prosecute all willful "blackout" violators under an act passed by the last session of the legislature. The duties of this board will be to review cases of blackout violations reported by air raid wardens and auxiliary police after an air raid or an air raid drill. This measure has become necessary because of the failure of some local residents to co-operate with the local air raid protection organization in keeping their lights burning during the blackout drills. The names of the members of the board were not announced.

Prominent Pleasant Gap Merchant Dies

He never deserted his first vocation—as storekeeper—he found time to aid greatly in the development of his home community.

He was chief organizer of White-rook Quarries which since 1911 has been the leading industry in Pleasant Gap. He was one of the organizers of the Pleasant Gap Water Supply Company, formed to provide the community with a safe and adequate water supply, and has always been the company's secretary and treasurer. He and his brother purchased what now is known as Noll's Grove, in the center of the town, and turned it over to the public for use for picnics, entertainments, and recreational purposes.

Although Mr. Noll never sought political office in his home township, he was a successful candidate for County Commissioner in 1911 and at the expiration of a four-year term was re-elected for another four years. Politically, he had always been a member of the Democratic party, and his advice in political matters was highly valued by political leaders through the years.

Mr. Noll retained an active interest in his business affairs until several weeks ago. Up until the onset of his last illness he spent much time at the store, and also maintained a deep interest in the welfare of White-rook Quarries, of which his son, Ray C. Noll, now is president and general manager. He attended the September meeting of the White-rook board of directors, of which he was a member. Mr. Noll was a member of the Methodist church. He was a member of the Golden Eagles, the Odd Fellows and was a life member of the Bellefonte Elks.

William Henry Noll, Jr., was a son of William Henry Noll and Eneline Egan Noll and was born at Pleasant Gap on November 25, 1889, making his age at time of death 51 years, 11 months, and 2 days. In 1883 he was united in marriage with Catherine Tate, who died a number of years ago. In 1897 he was married to Cora Teutmyer, who survives. Surviving children of the first marriage are: Mrs. E. P. Keller, Philadelphia, and Mrs. J. M. Moore, Pleasant Gap, and these children of the second marriage: Mrs. A. H. Smith and Ray C. Noll, both of Pleasant Gap; Mrs. F. C. Hamilton, Houtzdale, and Mrs. Hubert Koch, of State College.

Other survivors include the brother, J. Abner Noll, of Pleasant Gap, a sister, Mrs. H. T. Ramsey, of Harrisburg, and six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

To his legions of friends throughout the county Mr. Noll will be remembered as a gentlemanly, mild-spoken man whose unfailing good humor made him a welcome addition to any group. His influence in the town whose development he helped so greatly during the past sixty years, long will remain as a memorial to his active and useful life.

James L. Wilson Dies at College

Was Well Known Building Contractor; Prominent in Masonic Circles

J. L. Wilson, prominent State College contractor and builder, died at his home there at 5:25 o'clock Thursday afternoon, October 22, 1942, after an illness of six weeks' duration. He was aged 65. He was identified with much of the road building and heavy construction work in the State College community since he went to that town in 1922, including the greater part of the State College sanitary sewer system, much of the excavation work for State College town and campus buildings, and the excavation for the College's five million dollar State Authority building program several years ago. His last job in the town was the paving of the College avenue.

Before he went to State College he had been a contractor in the Johnstown and Altoona districts and in Georgia. He was a member of the board of directors of the Peoples' National Bank, State College, and was chairman of the board at the time of his death.

Mr. Wilson was a well-known figure in Masonic circles, belonging to State College Lodge No. 790, F. & A. M., and Nittany Council No. 57, R. & S. M. State College; Bellefonte Chapter No. 241, R. A. M., and Constant Commandry No. 33, K. T. Bellefonte; and the A. A. O. N. M. S. Jaffa Mosque, Altoona.

James Lewis Wilson was born in West township, Huntingdon county, on June 19, 1877, a son of George W. and Anna M. Stewart Wilson. In 1921, he was united in marriage to Olive P. Sniff of Jennerstown, who survives with one stepson, Captain James Weindel Sniff, with the U. S. Army Engineers at Fort Nelson, British Columbia. Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. F. W. DeMart, of Petersburg; Mrs. Bertina Nelson, of Philadelphia, and one brother, Roy S. Wilson, Philadelphia.

Funeral services were held at the Koch Funeral Home Saturday evening, with Rev. R. A. Selby, University Baptist church, in charge. The body was taken to Jennerstown Sunday, where committal services were held in the Jenner township cemetery.
