Sentences Passed
By Clinton Court
Liquor Seller, Employed By
Defense Plant, Has Sen-
tence Deferred

In a special session of Clinton county court, held Saturday, Oct. 24, the court November 4, to hear defendants who had entered pleas of guilty, Judge Henry Hipple sent one defendant to the Allegheny County Workhouse Ernest Donahy, who was sentenced for forgery.

Charles Farrington, Rote, who pleaded guilty to selling liquor without a license, and had pleaded guilty to a similar charge earlier in the year, could not be paroled without acting by the liquor board.

George E. Birch, of West Keating town, pleaded guilty to improper care of minor children. The family lives in a remote part of the county and the children have not been in school. He was given 30 days to find another home, where it will be possible to have the children in school.

Trucks engaged exclusively in the transportation of farm products and supplies have been exempted from another month from certain provisions of the Federal Motor Vehicle Act.

Both permits cover only movements originating or terminating at the farm. Previous exemptions expire Saturday, October 31, when the new exemptions become effective for a period ending November 30.

Pennington's 20,000 members of 4-H Clubs, which participates in the Agricultural extension program of the Pennsylvania State College, will join in the observance of National 4-H Achievement Week, November 7 to 14.

Seventeen horse owners of Berwick have formed themselves into a civilian defense group, to be ready for emergency call. Members of the group are prepared to search for parachutes, should necessity occur, or to do messenger service in areas where automobiles cannot be used.

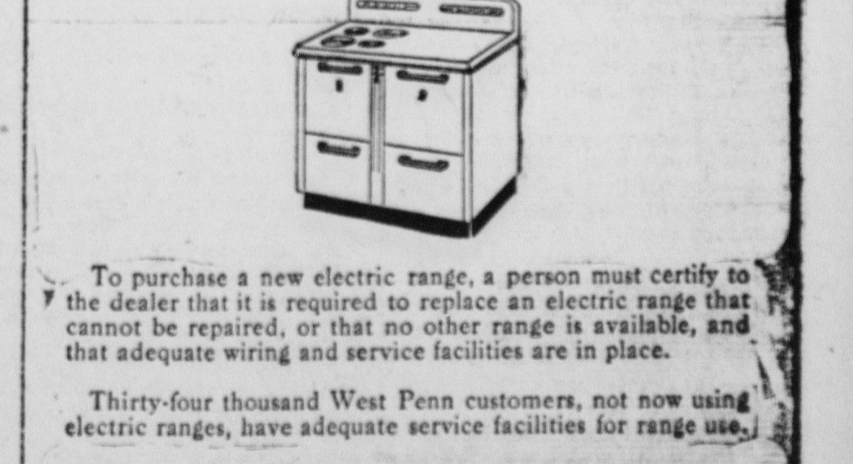

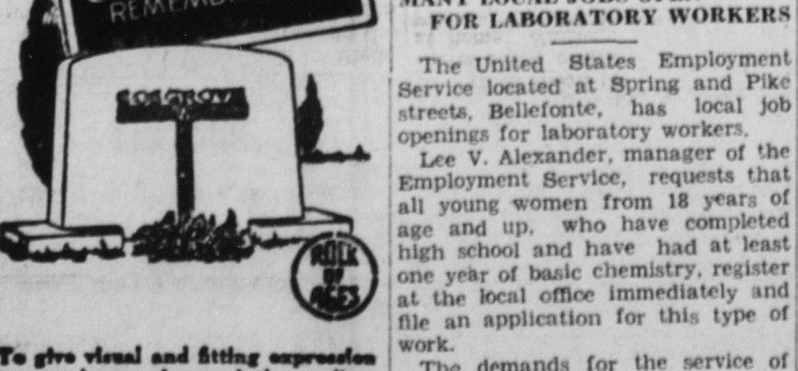
