Martin Is Governor General Edward Martin, Republi-

can soldier-lawyer, was swept into the Governor's office with a plurality of nearly 220,000 votes over the Democratic candidate, F. Clair Ross. All of Martin's running mates were elected and the GOP regained control of both houses of the State Legislature.

John C. Bell, Jr., became lieutenant governor and William S. Livergood, Jr., was re-elected State Secretary of Internal Affairs.

Republicans won 18 seats in Congress, the Democrats 12 and three remained in doubt. The tabulation to date showed a net gain of two seats for Republicans with two Philadelphia Democrats being defeated. The present line-up is 16 Republicans and 17 Democrats.

Voters gave Martin a workable majority in both branches of the State Legislature but apparently denied him the necessary two-thirds vote in the Senate to confirm ap-

pointments. With only 16 contests unreported, the House lineup was 124 Republicans and 68 Democrats. In the Senate, with three races undecided, the count with holdover senators showed 29 Republicans to 18 Democrats.

Interesting Talks At Club Meeting

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Mr. Adams, who had been a reserve officer in 1938, reviewed the present day methods of underground resistance in the conquered countries, naming specifically Holland and Czechoslovakia. The psychology of the German mind was the subject of Mr. McDonald's lucid address on a subject considered more or less vague. He spoke of the German methods of indoctrination and said he believed that winning the

war would be easier than changing the mind of the German people afterward, owing to the teaching they are now being given from the cradle up.

Several questions and further remarks were added by people in the audience, and a general discussion brought out much information that was very enlightening. In closing the program, the chairman, Mrs. S. E. Noll thanked the men for having given the club a red letter evening. The entire audience appreciated its good fortune in having such a discussion led by the district attorney and the school men of the county.
