## Gregg Schools Aid Scrap Drive

Over 33 Tons of Material Collected; Group Averages 586 Pounds Per Person

Gregg township school pupils turned in an enviable record in the scrap campaign, collecting over 33 tons of scrap after a campaign conducted for the past two weeks by four rural schools and the Spring Mills grade school and high school. Friday morning pupils gathered at the Gregg Township Vocational School at Spring Mills to hold a celebration in honor of one of the most successful drives in the county. Prizes were awarded to the various groups which took part in the drive. Statistics compiled after the gathering of all kinds of scrap, showed that the 318 boys and girls in the township turned in a total of 66,287 pounds of material. This amount is equal to 33.1 tons.

One group, the seventh and eighth grades of the Spring Mills grade school, established a record of which any group of scrap hunters might well be proud. These two grades, with a total of 34 pupils, turned in 19,937 pounds of scrap or an average of 586 pounds for each person. The grades are taught by J. Russell Condo.

The total for Spring Mills schools was 25.4 tons or an average of 216 pounds per pupil. The average for rural schools was 193 pounds per person.

The average amount of scrap gathered throughout the township by the 318 boys and girls was 210 pounds for each person.

Amounts collected by rural schools are: Hoy school, 5,815 pounds; Crossroads school, 3,825; Beaver Dam school, 3,509; Decker school, 2,552. Amounts collected by Spring Mills schools are: High school, 12,083 pounds; 7th and 8th grades, 19,937; 5th and 6th grades, 6,832; 1st and 2nd grades, 6,231; 3rd and 4th grades, 5,712. Meredith "Bud" Coldren, chairman of the scrap drive in the district, was guest speaker at the program held at the high school yesterday morning. The High School Band furnished music for the program.

(Continued from page one) been because he had made certain promises to persons, some of them now deceased, and did not feel at liberty to sign the measure. The tax penalty period was extended from November 1 to December 1 upon motion of Council. This is a customary procedure. While Council has not decided definitely to consolidate all borough offices at the Big Spring building, the plan is being considered favorably, and rough estimates placed the cost of necessary remodeling at \$625. Before making final decision Council authorized the Water Committee to prepare plans and specifications and obtain bids on the project. Remodeling of the building would provide a Council Chamber about 17 by 22 feet in size. In a letter to Council the Department of Highways asked the borough to notify citizens not to burn leaves on paved streets or highways, since the heat from such fires is highly destructive to concrete and bituminous surfaced roads. Because some residents of town have erected "no parking" signs on streets without permission to do so, police are asked to make a survey and remove any signs which have not been authorized. The police report submitted by Chief of Police Harry Dukeman revealed that from October 19 to November 2 there were 55 cars tagged, 4 larceny investigations, 5 auto accident investigations, 1 arrest for drunk and disorderly conduct and 3 transients lodged in the lockup. During the period the following stolen articles were recovered: watch, paint gun, sanding machine and electric wire. Receipts from parking meters totaled \$196.23 and from market fees \$9.60. The borough received \$980.65 from the State Treasurer for the Firemen's Relief Fund, the fire and police committee reported.
