Calendar For School Year

(Continued from page one) school days and a Saturday and Sunday, making a four day holiday each time. The New Year and Easter recesses have been omitted.

The schedule for the grade schools is practically the same as in former years, since the grades opened at the usual time. The schedule follows:

July 6, first day of fiscal year. September 9, first day of school. October 15 and 16, Teachers' Institute. October 22, end of first marking period.

November 26 and 27, Thanksgiving recess. December 7, end of second marking period. December 23, last day of school before Christmas recess.

January 4, first day of school after Christmas recess. January 27, end of third marking period. March 10, end of fourth marking period.

April 21, end of fifth marking period. April 23 to 26 inclusive, Easter recess. June 4, last day of school. July 4, last day of fiscal year.

The resignations of Mrs. Dorothy Wilkinson Crendon, Bruce Garner and Miss Bixel were received. Mrs. Crendon and her husband plan to go to housekeeping; Mr. Garner expects to be called to the service, and Miss Bixel has enlisted in the W.A.A.C.S. The personnel committee, consisting of Dr. E. H. Adams and R. C. Blaney was given power to employ teachers to fill the vacancies as needed.

Because Mrs. Rosalie Bair, originally employed as secretary to the school board, has accepted the position of secretary to supervising principal E. K. Stock, the board is without a regular secretary. After discussion in which it developed that the position demands a person of some training or experience in keeping books and in general business procedure, the supervising principal was instructed to take whatever steps necessary to secure the proper person for the position.

Mrs. Louella Dale Cheesman was retained for another year to take charge of the school tax records. The grounds and building committee reported that the boiler in the Academy has been sold to theidelity Trust Company of Pittsburgh, owners of the property, for \$500 and complete release of the board from any and all damage claims. Originally the bank demanded that the school board leave the boiler in the building and pay \$300 damage to the property during the school's tenancy.

The grounds and buildings committee was instructed to hire an additional woman cleaner at the high school building. This action was taken when it was reported that the present force of two women, working part time, was too small for the task.

Letters of thanks are to be sent to the following organizations for services or gifts to the new school: to the Logan Fire Company for turning out Saturday evening to extinguish a rubbish fire near the new high school; to the Tuberculosis Society for a set of scales for weighing school pupils, and to the Bellefonte Ministerium for their presentation of a Bible for the auditorium. The Logans are contemplating the purchase of a slide projector, the Tuberculosis Society is arranging for the purchase of a desk, chair and other equipment for the school clinic, and the Ministerium has indicated its willingness to provide a lectern for the auditorium, it was reported.

The Centre County Engineers' Society was granted permission to inspect the new building on Thursday, November 19. The inspection will begin at 4:15 p. m. and E. K. Stock, supervising principal, and R. C. Blaney, member of the board, will serve as guides and will speak at the organization's dinner following the visit to the school.

The solicitor and borough officials are to be consulted as to action in regard to the closing of Lamb street. The street has been formally closed by action of Council, but filling and grading operations can't be undertaken until the borough has installed necessary sewage and water lines across the property. The question to be decided immediately is whether or not traffic is to continue over the closed section.

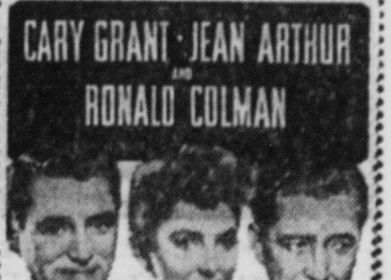
