PRE-INDUCTION COURSE OFFERED AT PENN STATE
Future soldiers and sailors in Uncle Sam's armed forces are being prepared by a pre-induction course offered at the Pennsylvania State College to students who will see military service within a few months.

MILLARD T. BUNNELL, co-ordinator, said that the courses would prepare students for military leadership and command, and revealed that lecture periods would be given on military sanitation, orientation, map reading and sketching, physical fitness, command, marksmanship, and principles of voice in instruction and command.

Students will be taught how to fire a rifle, train in squad and platoon formations, read and sketch contours and symbols of maps, learn about initiation and induction into military life, care of camps, and military courtesy and discipline.

ADVISES SERIOUS THOUGHT BEFORE WAR MARRIAGES
War marriages, involving couples under 20 years of age, should be thought out seriously, advised Professor Marion S. McDowell, director of the nursery school at the Pennsylvania State College and a specialist in family relationships.

Mrs. McDowell warned that most boys and girls under 20 do not gain enough emotional maturity to make good choices of partners, and advised that "emotional stability is the most important deciding factor in determining whether a marriage will be successful."

She pointed out that women must now face sex strains during separation, possible post-war invalidism of their husbands, possible widowhood, and the necessity of rearing their child alone.

Library Needs Larger Funds
(Continued from page one) catalogue and keep records on all books, perform janitor services, take care of public requests and inquiries; man the bookmobile on its regular routes, and perform various and sundry other matters without aid. And there is just no money in the coffers for such help.

The Librarian has been declared an essential link in the nation's war effort, for in addition to aiding in the nation's morale, it has been designated as the agency for distributing many kinds of information pertaining to defense and war matters. Those in charge of the library's affairs can get along with less than

the luxurious \$4.00 per capita of the Boston library. It can do without the \$2.56 per capita rate of the Cleveland library. Even the minimum of \$1.00 per capita recommended by the American Library Association looks like a veritable fortune to the County Library officials.

They could and would be able to carry out the full functions of the library for much less than the \$1.00 minimum.

But the present 8.8 cent rate is slow death. It is strangling the institution to an untimely death.

Two methods of saving the day have been suggested. One is increased appropriations from taxing agencies. This possibly would be the best method but taxing agencies are already overtaxed.

The other method would be contributions from lodges, organizations and other groups. These organizations are being approached from every angle for donations for other causes, and there is a limit to their abilities.

But most of us agree that the library is a valuable community asset. Most of us recognize its value to the county. Most of us want to see it continued, on a sound and reasonable financial basis.

The money must come from somewhere—and soon.

Girl And Soldier Killed On Street
When a car driven by W. Malcolm Borst got out of control and bounded over the curbing to the sidewalk at Hollidaysburg early Sunday morning, it struck and killed Alma Wentz, 23, and Sergeant Patrick M. Feeney, of Newark, N. J., a student at the Keystone Radio School, Hollidaysburg.

Both victims died in the Altoona Mercy Hospital. They had just alighted from a Hollidaysburg street car, when the automobile, which apparently failed to make the turn at the Gaysport bridge approach from Duncansville, leaped the sidewalk and struck them.

The car, it is reported to have continued on about 150 feet and miraculously escaped hitting several telephone poles and crashed through Hoover's Blue Sunoco gasoline station at the corner of Allegheny and Juniata streets and into O'Neill's hotel building, breaking a large window and causing other damage to the building.

Borst was taken before Justice of the Peace Charles A. Beswick of Hollidaysburg and placed under \$2,000 bail on charges of involuntary manslaughter and assault and battery with automobile.

Motorman C. L. Prizon, operator of the Hollidaysburg street car from which the two had just alighted and to the sidewalk, was changing gears and was at the front part of his street car when he heard a crash and saw the Borst automobile completely stop and his wheels slipping in the gasoline station grounds with the front part inside the hotel bar, and then saw the girl and soldier lying on the street some distance away.

Going to the aid of the two injured, it was found that Miss Wentz had been "knocked out" of both shoes and the soldier was missing one shoe, and both were lying in a pool of blood.

Miss Alma Wentz was born in Roaring Spring, March 3, 1919, a daughter of William M. and Pearl Moore Wentz. Surviving are the parents and two brothers. She was employed as a sales clerk in Karasch's leather store in Altoona.

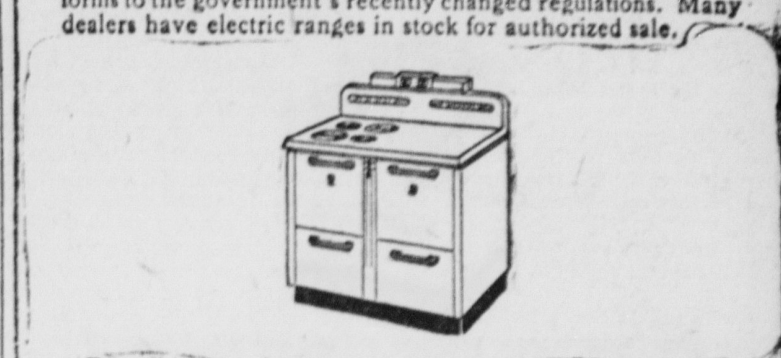

You can buy an electric range now, if your situation conforms to the government's recently changed regulations. Many dealers have electric ranges in stock for authorized sale.



To purchase a new electric range, a person must certify to the dealer that it is required to replace an electric range that cannot be repaired, or that no other range is available, and that adequate wiring and service facilities are in place.

Thirty-four thousand West Penn customers, not now using electric ranges, have adequate service facilities for range use.

In some instances, even the range circuit is in place ready to have a range plugged in. In other cases, only the range circuit is required and contractors can install these as long as they have the materials.
