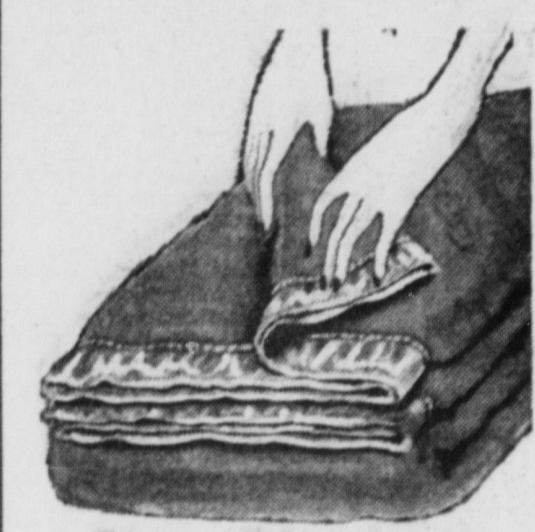

They have been in foreign service since last Easter. Lewis Loss, the brother wounded in action, attended the Pleasant Gap High School and was employed by White Rock Quarries there until entering the service. While in Pleasant Gap he made his home with his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Gill in that community. On October 29, 1941, several months after his enlistment, he was married to Miss Janet Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Smith, of West Linn street, Bellefonte. His brother, Jack, was employed on the Ira Benner farm in Benner township before enlisting in the Marines. 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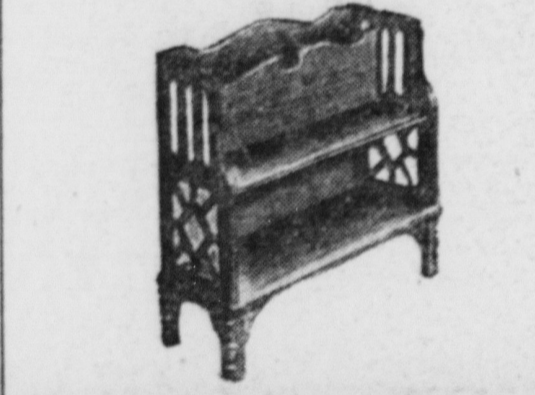


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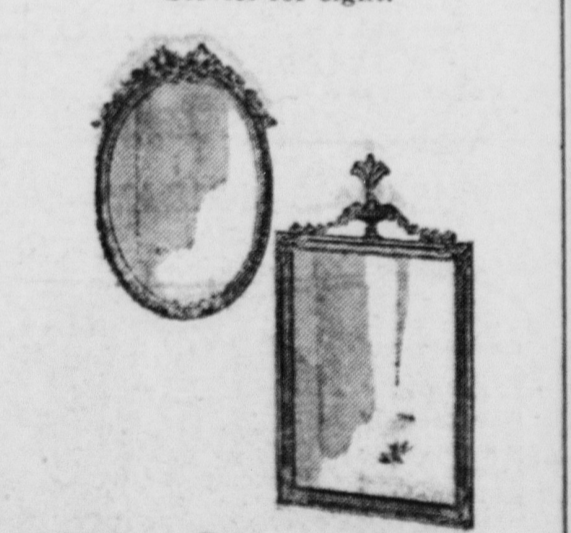
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
