Centre County Aiding In Government Effort to Raise Nine Billion Dollars

Members of Victory Fund Committees in the 90 counties comprising the Third Federal Reserve District on Monday morning, November 30, will start soliciting investors in their respective communities to help the U. S. Treasury raise nine billion dollars for the war effort. Meetings of Victory Fund Chairmen and their members in each county and executive sessions at the Philadelphia Federal Reserve Bank during the last week, paved the way for this vast Victory Fund drive, the largest financing campaign in the history of the world.

This task was assigned to the Victory Fund members by the Secretary of the Treasury, Henry A. Morgenthau, Jr., who declares "Every American should lend every available dollar to our Government. Every American corporation with available cash should purchase suitable Treasury issues. The Treasury Department has created issues of securities to meet the requirements of all investors with accumulated savings or idle funds."

The Victory Fund plea is directed specifically to individual investors, corporations, trusts and estates, pension funds, educational, religious, and endowed institutions, fraternal and social organizations, insurance companies, mutual savings banks, credit associations, cemeteries, state municipal and local pension and sinking funds, and all types of beneficial and savings institutions.

A new issue, the Victory Bonds of 1963/68 bearing 2 1/2 per cent interest will be the feature of a "package" of U. S. Treasury securities, including shorter term bonds, Treasury certificates and Tax Savings Notes, that each Victory Fund Committeeman will offer to his respective prospects. As a member of the committee, his work in the drive is entirely voluntary. In every instance, he has been chosen because of his experience in the financial world. The respective county chairmen are responsible bank executives. Participating in the drive in this area are: M. K. Bobb, Bellefonte; Claude G. Aikens, State College; Eugene F. Description of New Issues

The 2 1/2 per cent Victory Bonds of 1963/68 are issued at par and accrued interest either as bearer bonds with interest coupons attached or in registered form. These bonds are eligible for loans, including loans by commercial banks. Income from these Victory Bonds is subject to all Federal taxes. The bonds are subject to estate, inheritance, gift or other excise taxes. Federal or State, but are exempt from all taxation imposed on the principal or interest by any state or local taxing authority. They are not callable until December 15, 1963.

A special provision, upon the death of the owner, permits the duly constituted representative of the deceased owner's estate, to redeem these bonds at par and accrued interest for the purpose of satisfying Federal estate taxes.

All types of investors, excepting commercial banks accepting demand deposits may buy these Victory Bonds. Subscription will be received at the Federal Reserve Banks and branches and at the Treasury Department, Washington, D. C. The Victory Fund Committeemen, bank, securities dealer or broker will submit the subscription free of charge.

The 1 1/2 Treasury Bonds of 1948 also are issued at par and accrued interest and have the same form, collateral features and tax status as the Victory Bonds. They are not callable prior to maturity, June 15, 1948.

The 7/8 per cent Certificates of Indebtedness, Series E-1943, are due Dec. 1, 1943 and carry the same redemption, collateral, tax status and allotment features as the 1 3/4 Treasury Bonds. For all classes of subscribers, other than commercial banks, subscription books opened November 30 and continue several weeks, but commercial bank subscriptions will be limited to December 16, 17 and 18.

Farm Question Box

Q—I am bothered with snails in my cellar. How can I get rid of them?

A—Whitewash is about the best thing to use on cellar walls, but it will not bother the snails or slugs. Snails and slugs hide under boards, stones and rubbish; and the first thing to do is to clear up as many such hiding places as one can. The next step is to dust hydrated lime over the floor; it kills the slugs to crawl over a dry dust. Lastly, make a bait of bran, molasses and arsenate of lead, and put a bit here and there for them to eat.

Q—Is it possible to change the butterfat test of a cow by changing her feed?

A—Almost any change of feed, change of weather, or even change of attendant, will cause a slight fluctuation in butterfat content. But it usually returns pretty soon to about the normal percentage the cow inherited from her ancestors.

Q—How should I feed an idle horse for the winter?

A—Feed six pounds of hay and one quart of grain twice a day. Then add a little if the horse is very hungry or begins to get thin.

Q—Please send bulletin on "Potato Diseases and Their Control."

A—Very glad to get this for you. Write again whenever we can help.

Q—What can be done to prevent pullets from eating their eggs?

A—When birds eat their eggs, do this: Gather eggs often, have nests dark, put china eggs and bits of white paper in nests and on floor, trim off upper beak to the quick.

Q—Can you give us some help on hoof rot?

A—Hoof rot is a fungus disease fostered by wet, dirty yards. The usual control is to keep stock on dry yards or floors; scrub the affected hoof with green soap and then dip it in a strong solution of bluestone and paint over that with tar. A box of powdered bluestone and hydrated lime set in the stable doorway where all stock have to walk through, it helps a lot to check the trouble.

Q—I would like information on raising goats for milk.

A—Let me send you bulletins on sheep and goats. Then I can help with any particular problems the bulletins fail to answer for you.

Q—How can we get rid of bats?

A—If you have only one, get some youngster to knock it down with an old tennis racket, or put a cat in there to catch it. The remedy for bats is to plug all possible means of entrance, and then fumigate to kill those already inside.

County Adds To Tonnage of Scrap

Centre county contributed some more to its already creditable scrap tonnage through the Pearl Harbor Day drive held Monday. Scrap piles throughout the county grew visibly when many persons gave the 10 pounds per person, the goal set by the State Civilian Defense Committee.

County industries helped to raise the tonnage by making a number of tons available for the war effort. Whiterock Quarries at Pleasant Gap reported that 37,000 pounds of scrap was sold, the Bellefonte Central Railroad Company reported an additional 9,000 pounds following the 104,500 pounds which was sold two weeks ago.

The Swartz machine shop in Bellefonte reported that 11 tons of desirable scrap was sold. The Pennsylvania State College reported the collection of 12,770 pounds.

School children in many localities contributed scrap to the depots in their communities. In many places chairmen said the work of collecting material would continue this week.

No report of the actual tonnage received through Monday's campaign was available but it was believed the county fell short of its goal of 250 tons. R. J. Kennard, State College, County Salvage and Waste chairman, stated that a complete report will be available soon.
