

Nearly 200 at Veterans' Dinner

(Continued from page one) W. W. Hampton and L. R. Glenn, members of the dinner committee, were introduced by the toastmaster who also thanked the American Legion and members of the Women's Auxiliary for their help in planning the affair.

Among those who were introduced and who spoke briefly were: Charles E. Dorworth, and James R. Hughes, both of Bellefonte; Russell Evey, commander of the State College VFW Post; John Mong, commander of the Bellefonte Post, and Pvt. James J. Leitzell, former commander of the local post.

Following the introduction of Mrs. George Waite, of Bellefonte, a Gold Star mother of World War I. Mrs. Howard Casper paid tribute to mothers who have three or more sons or daughters serving in the present war.

Registration To Begin Tomorrow

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Those in the same district born on or before September 1, 1924, but not after October 31, 1924, will register during the week beginning Friday, December 18, and ending Thursday, December 24. Hours will be the same. Those registering in Millheim will do so Monday, December 21, from 2 to 7 p. m. There will be no registration on the College campus for this group.

College students on Christmas vacation, will register with their home boards. Those in the State College area who were born after November 1, 1924, but not after December 31, 1924, will register during the period beginning December 26, and ending Thursday, December 31.

Students in this group who are on

vacation will register with their home town boards. Millheim registrants will go to the Municipal building Monday, December 28, from 2 to 7 p. m. All others will register at the Board No. 1 office in State College or at the nearest Board. Hours are the same for the State College Board in all cases.

No registration will take place at offices in the postoffice building in Bellefonte, but will be held in various communities throughout the county, according to Board No. 2 in Bellefonte.

Volunteer staffs of workers will sit at registration places on dates designated by the Bellefonte Board. Registration in Bellefonte will be held at the Logan Fire House from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. on December 11, 14, 18, 21, 28 and 29. Mrs. Roy Wilkinson will be chief registrar.

In Phillipsburg young men may register at the Hope Fire Company Hall on the same dates from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Mrs. George Peters will be in charge. The Port Matilda schedule is 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. December 12, 19 and 26. Headquarters will be at the schoolhouse.

In Sandy Ridge, registration will be held from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. December 15, 22 and 29. Arrangements have not been completed for Oristown, Howard, Munson, Osceola Mills, and Clarence.

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ate business in Florida. For the past number of years Mr. Junious had spent the winter months in Florida, leaving his business interests here in charge of Harry Commenduros, manager of the Texas Lunch.

The only surviving members of his family are believed to be two brothers and two sisters, last known to reside in Greece. The only relative in this country insofar as is known is a cousin, Louis Castrihls, who has lived in Bellefonte for the past number of years. His wife died before he moved to Bellefonte.

Mr. Junious was a member of the Undine Fire Company and took an active interest in local affairs. He was a member of Club 33, Brooks-Doll Post American Legion, Bellefonte, and had been an active member of the Bellefonte Chamber of Commerce since its organization.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the E. E. Widdowson Funeral Home, North Allegheny street, with a Greek priest from Altoona officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery.

Through his long association in the restaurant business, Mr. Junious became well known to hundreds of Centre countians, and his little "hot dog shop" was one of the busiest in a 11 enterprises in Bellefonte. Through good times and bad the restaurant remained one of the town's most popular eating places, and amazing numbers of "hot dogs with everything" plus a few other staple dishes poured in a steady stream over its counter.

Indications yesterday were that the business would be continued. The lunch was closed—for the first time in 17 years—Sunday, Monday

and Tuesday of this week, but again opened yesterday morning with Mr. Commenduros in charge until permanent arrangements have been completed.
