Then, as was a frequent custom, he had continued his walk along the ridge road and apparently was stricken a few minutes later as he stood on a culvert at a crossroads. When he failed to come home for supper, members of the family began search, and found his body below the culvert where he had fallen. Apparently death had been instantaneous.

In spite of the fact that a "new" baby in the Irwin family last Spring made great inroads on the time Mrs. Irwin could devote to the home, the family planted a "small" garden which yielded 445 quarts of vegetables and other produce plus what the family used during the summer. Butchering day is to be held soon, and the canning of meat is expected to increase the family home food production for the year to more than 600 quarts. In addition there is a large quantity of garden produce in storage for use during the winter. The Irwin home is neat as a pin. Household equipment includes a number of electrical appliances. All the work on the farm was performed by Mr. Irwin and his two older sons, Eddie, aged 14, and Gordon, aged 12, with the exception of three days during a rush season when a hired hand was employed. All income and all expenses on the farm and home during the year are neatly and accurately kept in booklets furnished by the FSA so that at any time Mr. Irwin knows exactly what each department of the farm costs and what income it is returning.

Much the same story could be told about the other 74 families in the county who this week received the Merit of Award, Mr. Havens said. Some of the records are better than the participating farmers have attained at least the production record they set for themselves at the beginning of the year. With the production of food rapidly becoming one of the foremost problems in the war effort, the FSA is playing a most important part in keeping the small farms of the nation producing at their highest capacity.

Born and reared on a farm, Mr. Crider owns and operates a farm in Virginia. He served both as secretary and vice president of the Federal Land Bank of Baltimore from 1932 to 1942.

Hunter Dies In Woods Near Home

Found By Snow Shoe Man, Member of Another Hunting Party

Stricken by a heart attack while hunting in the woods on his farm near Beech Creek, Charles P. Heimer died while separated from his companions. Mr. Heimer and a crew of six other men, including his two sons, Norman and George, had gone hunting in the morning and had hunted on the side and top of the mountain near the Heimer farm in Beech Creek township. At about 1 p. m. Mr. Heimer who had been hunting on the mountain, was about half a mile from his home on the watch, when he suddenly fell, gun in hand, and expired. He was found by Claude Force of Snow Shoe, a member of another hunting crew, and was identified by Harry W. Packer.


He was a life long resident of Beech Creek township, the son of the late Phillip and Mary Heimer, pioneer residents. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and a trustee for a long period of years, and a member of the P. O. S. of A.
