## Defendant Fails to Appear for Trial

Edwin Gustafson, of Philadelphia, charged with aggravated assault and battery was found not guilty by a jury and the jury placed the costs of prosecution on the prosecutor, Benjamin Travis of Philadelphia. At the conclusion of criminal court, Tuesday, the single case ready for trial on the civil list was heard and a jury returned a verdict of \$12.24 for the plaintiff, Margaret H. Rowbridge. Train Derailed

A hundred workmen on Monday cleared the tracks of the Reading railroad after a 16-car freight train loaded with Christmas decorations and glassware was derailed about 10 miles east of Danville. Officials attributed the accident to a broken rail, probably caused by frost.

# Y. M. C. A. Aiding Jap War Prisoners

"It is very encouraging to learn that the War Prisoners Aid of the Y. M. C. A. is being permitted to carry on in Japan the work it has been doing for prisoners of war in other countries, both Allied and Axis," said Mr. Strong. "It indicates Japan's intention of abiding by the Geneva Convention of 1929, which sets up standards for the treatment of prisoners of war."

The Japanese Government signed this pact and although it did not really do so, Tokyo has expressed its intention of adhering to its provisions.

Shortly after America entered the war, the neutral committee headed by the Swedish Minister to Japan was authorized by the War Prisoners Aid to spend whatever funds educational, and religious supplies for Americans taken prisoner by the Japanese. Because of the difficulty of communication, no word had been received until today as to what progress had been made in this work.

The World's Committee of the Y. M. C. A., an international organization with headquarters in Gen-

eva, Switzerland, works among prisoners of war in both Allied and Axis countries. Neutral secretaries, mostly Swiss, Swedish and Danish, visit prison camps to study the needs of the men behind barbed wire and to provide guidance and materials for their leisure-time activities.

How many American fighting men are held prisoner by the Japanese is not known, although the United States casualty list announced on Monday of this week listed 1,292 captives and 42,272 missing men. It is believed many now listed as missing are among those held by the enemy.
