

Driver Blamed In Fatal Crash

They saw no trafapproaching and began to pul ross the highway when their car was struck by the Heath machine. Allison said he had his headlights on all the time during the drive rom Hecla. All witnesses said the night was a "bright" one and visi-

ity was good. The occupants of the Heath ma hine related that they came to Bellefonte early in the evening, and experiencing difficulty with a rundown battery, took the car to the county Chevrolet garage to have the attery charged while they attendd the movies. After the movies they sturned to the garage and were old that the battery didn't take a harge. So they drove to the Decker arage where they left the car while went to a restaurant. Returnabout a half hour later, they ound that the battery still wouldn't ake a charge and it was necessary or garagemen to push the machine get the motor started.

The lights were so dim that they veren't of any use, and when they were turned on the motor wouldn't operate properly, the witnesses said

So when they reached the county home, Heath turned out the lights, switching them on only two or three times after that when other cars

He said that as he approached the intersection he didn't see any signs of a car, but that just as he entered the intersection he saw a "flash" of light and saw the car coming out of the side road. The Heath car, after the impact, swung around and rolled over on its side against a culvert at the northeast corner of the intersection.
