DYNAMIC CHRISTIAN LIVING
International Sunday School Lesson
for December 27, 1942.

GOLDEN TEXT: "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good."—Romans 12: 21.

Lesson Text: Rom. 12: 1-3; 9-21

It is fitting that this series of lessons should close with a discussion such as this. It will be recalled that the theme of the last quarter's lessons was "Studies in Christian Life, Personal, Family, and Church."

The Book of Romans can be divided into two main parts, the first, chapter 1 to 11, is doctrinal, and the second part, beginning with the twelfth chapter, practical.

Every precept in the twelfth chapter sends its roots right down through all the rich, fat soil of sanctification and justification and the mysterious energies of redeeming grace.

Because of what God has done for us, we should present to Him ourselves, dedicated to His service, responsive to His will.

Paul also cautions against self-conceit. "For I say through the grace that was given me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; according as God hath dealt with each man a measure of faith."

Outdoor Lights Are Permitted

(Continued from page one) few rules in regard to outdoor Christmas lighting.

1. Christmas lighting on stores and store fronts must be connected with the blackout switch which is operated from an accessible position at the front of the store.

2. At least two responsible persons must be delegated with responsibility for operating each blackout switch in order to guarantee that lights will be extinguished immediately in any emergency.

3. Decorative lighting of homes, inside and out, is permissible if some responsible person of the household is on the premises who can and will turn off all lighting in an emergency.

4. Decorative outdoor lighting erected by municipal authorities and public organizations is permissible if the other requirements listed above in 1. and 2. are met.

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On Monday a porker was killed at Penn State College by Jacob Krumrine, that dressed 777 pounds of meat. It was of the famous Poland China stock and the largest porker we think killed in the state this year.
