chard's service station on November 2, without paying for the same.
According to police, Wallheiser on November 2 entered the Long Service Station and found Mrs. Long alone in the establishment. He demanded the money from the cash drawer but Mrs. Long began screaming and called for her husband to bring the gun. This apparently frightened the man and he left. Mr. Long was not at the premises at the time. On the day of the holdup attempt Wallheiser was driving a car owned by Michael Raffetta, of Altoona, which had been stolen.
After the Sandy Ridge episode, police broadcast a Statewide warning, and the following day Wallheiser's trail was picked up in Youngsville, Pa., where he bought gasoline without paying for it. Later in the day the car was seen traveling toward Erie and a patrolman forced it off the road, and apprehended the driver. Police said they believe Wallheiser may have been implicated in a series of car thefts in Erie and Altoona, and that cars taken in one city were disposed of in the other, in a kind of endless chain.
Wallheiser will be brought to Bellefonte to face the local charges when the case in Erie has been settled.

blaze under control.
The refrigerator was ruined by fire, while the kitchen, dining room, living room, first floor bathroom and a stairway leading to the second floor were badly damaged by smoke and gas. The plaster in all the rooms was cracked, paint was blistered in many places, and the refrigerator gas had an odd effect on the house furnishings. In the bathroom some paint was eaten away, leaving undercoats of paint exposed. Some trimmings on the Christmas tree changed color under the exposure to the gas. Household appliances coated with a silver-colored metal crust of the gas with a brassy appearance. The bright red cover of a music book on the piano turned a dull brown where the gas touched it. The walls and ceilings of most of the first floor rooms were covered with a dull smudge which apparently condensed into moisture and ran down the walls, streaking them badly even though firemen used no water or chemicals in those rooms in battling the blaze.
