State College Soldier, on Leave, Discovers One Honest Man
The Harrisburg Patriot on Saturday morning printed the following story of a State College soldier on leave:

Friday night Fleming noticed a little red book on the shelf in one of the telephone booths. He looked it over, noticed a number of names and addresses and then discovered six new ten dollar bills tucked away between the pages.

At the present time there is no limit on the "take" of the County Treasurer. He is permitted to keep a percentage of all the funds which he throws through his office, regardless of what the percentage may total in a year's time.

Under the sixth-class county rules, the Treasurer continues to collect a percentage, but after his income reaches \$4,000 he must turn such additional percentages over to the county. In other words the Treasurer, if business is good, will receive \$4,000 a year, and the county may derive some income from that office. On the other hand, if business is poor, the Treasurer may not reach the \$4,000 limit and apparently will have to be satisfied with whatever the office earns.

Census Affects County Offices

by the three offices will be paid to the county, and the county will pay the incumbents' salaries and expenses.

The County Commissioners who now receive \$1,900 each annually, will be paid \$3,000 each year under the new classification. For the three commissioners this means a total salary increase a year from the present \$5,400 to \$9,000.

The County Commissioners and the County Treasurer will become members of a county salary board and will meet the first Monday of each year to fix the salaries of county employees for the year.

The office of sheriff, which now pays \$3,000 and expenses annually, will pay \$4,000 and expenses after this year.

Auditors and Jury Commissioners who now receive a fee of \$5 a day and mileage, will receive \$6 a day and mileage.

Members of the board of view will receive \$10 per day and mileage, instead of the present \$7.50 and mileage.
