Young Woman, Ill, Leaps from Train

Jumps Through Car Window As Train Reaches Antes Fort Station

Believed to have suffered a nervous breakdown, Helen Kopas, 23, of Cranefield, Erie county, smashed the window of a railroad car in which she was riding and jumped out at the Antes Fort station of the Pennsylvania Railroad last Tuesday afternoon.

Railroad police and State motor police called to the scene ascribed no motive to the action except the nervous state of mind of the young woman.

Miss Kopas was brought to Williamsport and confined there pending notification of friends or relatives of Erie county to come and take her in custody.

The young woman suffered no injuries from the jump except lacerations of the hand received when she smashed the train window just as it was pulling into the Antes Fort station. She was en route from Baltimore to Erie.

General Martin Becomes Pennsylvania's Governor At Ceremony, Tuesday

Military Note In Inauguration of State's Chief Executive; 'Winning War, Plans for Afterward to Guide Administration'

The inauguration on Tuesday of Governor-elect Edward Martin as Pennsylvania's next chief executive was carried out with a simple ceremony surrounded with a military atmosphere of a dozen Army officers as part of the official party and the firing of a 19-gun salute.

Among the inaugural party on the platform in front of the capitol was the Governor-elect's son, Capt. Edward S. Martin, and representatives of nearby Army posts.

The ceremony began at noon with Major Frank D. Scott, Army chaplain, delivering the invocation and William J. Ridge, State Senate clerk reading Martin's certificate of election.

Chief Justice George W. Maxey of Pennsylvania delivered the oath of office at 12:05 p. m. and then preceding the inaugural speech—the governor's flag was unfurled and a salute of 19 guns given.

The complete cabinet selected by Governor Martin consists of the following appointments: Attorney General—James P. Duff, Pittsburgh attorney, \$12,000 a year.

Secretary of Highways—John U. Shroyer, Shamokin dress manufacturer, \$12,000 a year. He replaces I. Lamont Hughes of Harrisburg.

Motor Police Commissioner—Deputy Commissioner C. M. Wilhelm, \$8,000 a year, succeeds Major Lynn G. Adams.

Secretary of Revenue—Edward B. Logan, of Upper Darby, was named budget secretary at \$8,000 a year, a post he held earlier in the James administration.

Secretary of Banking—William C. Freeman, of Cornwall, former state senator, \$10,000 a year. A banker in private life, he replaces John C. Bell, Jr., lieutenant governor-elect.

Secretary of Labor and Industry—The accident occurred, it was reported, while both trains were moving at reduced speed.

Q—What is the proper way to make salt pork?

A—In its simplest terms, you put the meat in a salt brine, using 10 pounds of salt, 2 ounces of salt-peter and about 5 gallons of water for 100 pounds of meat.

Q—May I have plans for a hen-house to house 500 birds?

A—I will get you a bulletin on that. In general, figure on 4 square feet of floor space per hen and a shed-roof house 6 feet at rear, 8 feet at front, and 14 feet deep.

Q—How can I make a homemade candier for eggs?

A—It is easy to make a candier, and one can soon learn to candie eggs. Make a black box about three or four inches square, eight inches long and open at both ends.

Q—Is sawdust suitable for insulating a top-floor ceiling or attic?

A—Sawdust is not nearly as good a material for insulating as kiln-dried shavings, buckwheat hulls, redwood bark, rock wool, or cork.

Q—Can super phosphate be used in place of commercial fertilizer with an ample supply of manure for sprouts and cauliflower?

A—Better save what complete analysis fertilizer you have for side-dressing, and use around 500 to 1000 pounds of 20 per cent super phosphate per acre and 5 to 10 tons of manure.

Q—What sort of spray should be used to keep trees, and when?

A—Start with the sulphur 1 to 15, in late fall or very early spring, to control the leaf curl fungus. Use a mild sulphur dust or spray when shucks fall to check brown rot.
