**WILLIAM OLIVER STRUNK**  
William Oliver Strunk died at his home in Centre Hall at 11:30 o'clock Monday night, January 25, 1943, after a two-year illness. The deceased, a son of William and Fayette Fiedler Strunk, was born in Centre county on January 24, 1872, making his age at time of death 71 years and 1 day. He was the last member of his family and the sole survivor of his wife, the former Fannie Schmar. Mr. Strunk was a member of the Lutheran church. Funeral services will be held at the Goodhart funeral home, Centre Hall, at 2 o'clock this Thursday afternoon, with Rev. C. C. Otto officiating. Interment will be made in the Centre Hall cemetery.

He was a member of the B. of E. T. No. 498, the P. R. R. relief and the Altoona lodge of Elks. Mr. Garman was of the Methodist faith.

### S. STEWART LYON

S. Stewart Lyon, of Germantown, former resident of Bellefonte, died at the Veterans' Hospital in Philadelphia at 1:15 o'clock yesterday morning, January 27, 1943, after an illness of about five years. Mr. Lyon was a son of John Lyon and was a grandson of Stewart and Ann Valentine Lyon, well known in this area. Had he lived until February 4 he would have been 56 years old. tended to penal institutions during the ensuing 12-month period. The budget must be based on a combination of past experience and super-guesswork.

For the County Superintendent of Schools the Commissioners budgeted \$1,000 at the beginning of 1942, and during the year the office cost \$1,708.04.

For National Defense purposes the budget called for \$1,000 and expenditures totaled \$1,149.80. This excess is a pardonable one, for at the beginning of the year the defense program was in its early stages and the Commissioners had no way of determining what financial demands would be made on the county for defense purposes.

A fund of \$200 was set aside for the township supervisors, and expenses were \$203.95.

The budget was set up for \$100 expenditures for tax refunds, and the bill for the year was \$184.88. These expenses represent refunds to taxpayers for overpayments on personal property tax, and it is exceedingly difficult to determine beforehand how many of these items will occur.

The relative unimportance of the items in which the budget was exceeded during the year is apparent when the total of such excesses—\$1,296.08—is compared with the \$21,375.59 the county "saved" under budget estimates.

The county's estimates on receipts as compared with the actual funds turned into the coffers during the year also show up in favor of the Commissioners' estimates.

The budget estimated receipts at \$126,800, and actual money turned in during the year totaled \$153,736.73.

In the Institution District the picture is much the same, only two items having exceeded budget figures. A fund of \$34,220 was set aside for the care of inmates and operation of the home and the year's expenses were \$34,320.07. The other item was for interest on bonds, the budget estimate being \$1,850 and expenses \$1,901.25.

The Commissioners also erred on the side of conservatism in estimating Institution District receipts, their budget being \$87,400. Funds actually received were \$102,471.53.

The reason for the greater amount of receipts for the County and Institution District was largely because of unusually high collection of taxes during the year. The county estimated tax receipts at \$115,000 and received \$139,000. In the Institution District the estimate was \$83,400 and the actual receipts were \$97,654.93.

From the following tables a clear picture of the Commissioner's record for operating the County and Institution District well within the budget is obtained.

In the left column appears the 1942 budget estimates, in the middle column are the actual expenses during the year and in the right column appear the budget estimates for the year 1943.

The Commissioners last week announced a reduction in the millage for County purposes from 7 mills to 6 mills, while the Institution District tax rate was reduced from 6 mills to 4 mills, reducing the total tax levy for county purposes by three mills.

## CRIPPLED CHILDREN SOCIETY SUPPORTS PARALYSIS DRIVE

The Centre County Chapter of the Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has opened its annual drive for funds to carry on the work of providing needed help for the children of our nation who have been stricken with this dread disease, and Centre county is asked to contribute its quota promptly and cheerfully.

The Clearfield-Centre counties Society for Crippled Children is cooperating with this campaign because there is scarcely a clinic conducted at the Philadelphia State Hospital by the Society which does not reveal the presence of a number of paralysis cases.

Out of the fifty or more children who are examined and treated each month, a great many are suffering from paralysis or the direct results of an attack of this disease upon their bodies when they were younger and for which they did not receive immediate treatment.

When the very first symptoms of paralysis appear every child should at once be referred to a physician for diagnosis and treatment, officials warned. The inter-county society conducts a clinic every month and many afflicted children are being saved or materially helped. The Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has furnished money for braces, shoes and other appliances for paralysis victims and has contributed liberally for examinations and treatments. When you contribute to the Foundation you are also assisting your local Society for Crippled Children. A visit to the Philadelphia clinic will convince any one of the great importance of this work.

The Clearfield-Centre Counties Society for Crippled Children is cooperating with the Foundation's campaign which is now in progress. Society officials urge that the drive be well supported.
