Seeks Data On Borough Streets

of such equipment in an effort to secure additional units; that another type of collector is being tried out at the plant, and that the company engineers are now at work designing a new type of collector.

After another discussion on the matter of assessments in the Borough Council president William W. Sleg instructed the secretary to get in touch with the American Appraisal Company to ask for suggestions or recommendations for correcting present inequalities in the borough assessments.

Council approved the West Penn Power Company's pole tax statement for \$94.40. The fund is for the annual borough tax of 20 cents a pole upon the company's 472 poles in the borough.

The Water Committee noted the collection of \$1601.45. Total collections from parking meters no date were reported to be \$7,721.21, and collections for the month of January were \$192.16.

Councilman Eberhart suggested that the traffic lights at the corner of Allegheny and Howard streets be turned off for the duration of the war and that regular "stop" signs be erected at the intersection. The matter was referred to the Fire and Police Committee.

The Town Improvement Committee reported that the West Penn Power Company will check sources of radio interference next week, acting upon a number of complaints received in recent weeks.
