New Element Created

The University of California's 250ton cyclotron has "created" a new element-number 93-and may enable scientists to discover still another, it was announced today.

Dr. Edwin M. McMillan of the University of California and Dr. Philip Hauge Abelson of the Carnegie institute, co-workers with Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence who built the atom smasher, "created" the new element by bombarding a minute bit of uranium with neutrons in the powerful magnetic field of the machine. The new element is the heaviest known.

Actually, the new element was created by the re-arrangement of uranium's stomic structure, since the cyclotron can build up, as well as tear down, atoms. The scientists said they had not determined the properties of the element.

\$40,000 Fire Loss.

A \$40,000 blaze that destroyed two big, modern barns on the Bowden peach farm, three miles south of Danville, burned 3,000 chickens. The fire is of unknown origin. Animals saved included 15 cattle, 35 hogs, two mules and a horse. Large quantities of grain and several almost new pieces of farm machinery were also destroyed. Firemen from seven commuities aided in saving the farm nouse and many other buildings.
