

Revise Air Mail Pickup Schedule

Will Provide Later Evening Service; Earlier Morning Pickup

New air mail pick-up schedules providing later evening service and earlier morning and midday service will become effective here on Monday, February 22, Postmaster George R. Meek has announced.

The new schedules are:

The evening air mail pick-up flight, the postmaster said, makes trunk-line connections at Pittsburgh affording overnight service to all parts of the country.

The incoming flights from Pittsburgh also makes midday connections affording delivery the same day in Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Buffalo, Dayton, Columbus, Washington, New York, Boston, Chicago, Harrisburg, Philadelphia, and other points.

The incoming flights from Pittsburgh make possible the delivery here the same day of the air mail that collects at the Pittsburgh terminal overnight and up until a late hour in the morning from all parts of the country, giving the community the same rapid service for both inbound and outbound air mail as cities on the main airline system.

All schedules, the postmaster also said, provide swift local service to nearby points.

In order to take full advantage of the Air Pick-up service the postmaster urged patrons to deposit their air mail in the postoffice at least a half hour before flight time.

Air mail that is not dispatched on these schedules, he said, is forwarded to the nearest trunkline terminal by train causing a delay that seriously impairs and often destroys the value of the service.

The Bellefonte plant is one of 21 manufacturing plants operated by the National Gypsum Company and it is playing an active role in the war effort by supplying lime products for use in war materials. The plant here is equipped with the latest rotary kiln in the nation.

In addition to uses in war industries, lime products also serve many other industries. Lime from the Bellefonte plant is a vital material in the manufacture of synthetic rubber.
