Upon the death of the mother, the father moved his family back to his native Miles Township, where the children spent their youth in and about Rebersburg. Violetta attended the public schools of the latter place in the days when young folks were fortunate to come under the inspiring influence and intelligent instruction of the now venerable Prof. W. P. Hosterman, of Penn Hall. Possessed of a high purpose in life and a consuming ambition for further education, against great odds and almost entirely through her own efforts, in due season, this woman was graduated from both the Lock Haven State Normal School and Bucknell University. Before she went to Bucknell, her teaching experience was confined to the elementary schools of Rebersburg, Ligonias and Cross Forks, Pa. After she received her college degree, she

served several years as a teacher in the High School of Lakota, North Dakota. Upon returning east, she filled positions in the High School of Butler and Paterson, N. J., where she taught in turn both German and French. In order to become more proficient in the languages she had three summers of study and travel in Europe. Besides this, she chose extra summer courses at various times in the Universities of Vermont and Pennsylvania at Philadelphia. She was a woman, tireless in her efforts to instruct youth. Drawing from her own experiences, she constantly emphasized the fact that all obstacles could be surmounted. Indeed her many years of working in the service for others will always be a credit to Rebersburg, which she considered as her home town. Her husband, Samuel Smith, of Paterson, preceded her in death by two years. Her nearest surviving relative is a brother, Dwight Wolfe, of Philadelphia.
