Killed By Train. Anthony Edward Pekar, better known as Anthony Baker, 30, of Altoona, was killed when run over by an eastbound passenger train just east of the Johnstown station Tuesday morning. Pekar's body was found lying along the main line by H. C. Good, wreckmaster of the railroad. The body was cut in two. He was taken to a morgue in Johnstown to await disposition. He was born at Bitumen, Clinton County, March 21, 1913, a son of John and Catherine (Palcho) Pekar, and had resided in Altoona for the past 18 years.
