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Question Man in Taylor Murder Case

checked it was learned that he lived in Lemont about three hours when he moved his household goods there and then left.

He wasn't in the State College area at any time in 1940, police learned and had no car. A car figured prominently in the murder.

Phillips said he was born in Juniata and that his wife, from whom he now is separated, lived at Lemont at the time of the Taylor slaying. This part of his story seemed to check, police said.

But yesterday Phillips, father of two children, was still held at the Clinton County Jail while detectives of the State Motor Police and Clinton County authorities further investigated the possibility of his connection with the murder.

Although the investigating officers have as yet drawn no final conclusion in the matter, it is reported the time factor is one which might eliminate Phillips as a suspect in the Taylor case, despite the fact that he told officers he was working in a garage at Lemont at the time of the slaying. Other remarks which he made, one to the effect that he was one of the last persons to see Rachel Taylor alive, led police to place him in the county jail for questioning after he was picked up while at work Friday night at the paper mill.

He went to Lock Haven about a month ago to work and had been rooming at the S. C. Dickey home, 819 Bellefonte Ave., which is outside the city limits.

Mrs. Phillips, who now resides in Williamsport, contacted Lycoming County authorities with a view to having him arrested for non-support of herself and two children and a detainer was lodged against him Monday afternoon with the Clinton County authorities.

Phillips has done a lot of talking since his apprehension, police reported, and there are indications that he has several "girl friends." He has photographs of a number of different young women in his possession and he is said to have boasted on several occasions to fellow workers about his many affairs with women.

The men has apparently changed his location frequently.
