A. Build a floor of 2-inch planks

about 5 feet square and let it slope a little to keep it dry. Over this nail three sides and a roof that will turn wind and rain, and provide s bed of straw. The pen need be only large enough for the pig to move around a little, say 5 to 10 feet, with a good strong fence. Build a little V-shaped trough of 8-inch boards 4 feet long and you have all the equipment you need. Get a six-weeks-old pig and start it on calf meal and flour middlings mixed to that will give you a start, and prob-ably you can find more about this about a half pound in 2 quarts of a thick slop with warm water. Feed water two or three times a day, and shift gradually to prepared pig ration and up to 3 pounds of grain a day. Watch the pig and feed only what it will clean up promptly.
