County Sheepmen Elect Officers

(Continued from page one) ologist of State College, discussed the parasite problem which confronts Centre county sheepmen. He spoke of some of his research work in the control of internal parasites of sheep, in which he definitely proved that the best control of stomach and nodular worms of sheep was phenothiazine. This is the first treatment given satisfactory control of nodular worms. Dr. Thorp said that this type of control would replace the former treatment using nicotine sulphate and copper sulphate. In making recommendations, he stressed the fact that the manufacturer's directions should be carefully followed.

R. C. Blaney, County Agent, reported that the directors of the association had decided to purchase a supply of phenothiazine, making it available to Centre county sheep and wool growers, as nicotine has been in the past. W. B. Connell, in charge of Animal Husbandry Extension at State College, discussed the feeding and management of sheep under wartime conditions. He said that if ever

there was an opportunity to do a good job of managing sheep, it was this year. He also stated that sheepmen with a good supply of legume hay and good pasture will get by the present protein shortage better than most other livestock men. Mr. Connell pointed out that the government has requested that growers consign their wool direct to the government, instead of to the mills. He said that in Centre county this could be done through the wool pool which has been so successful in the past.
