Shecker of Milesburg, to establish the manner in which the accident happened. He was assisted by Deputy Coroner Frank Baird, of Milesburg, while attorneys for Mr. Guenot were Lewis Orvis Harvey and R. Paul Campbell, Philip H. Johnston was present as counsel for the railroad company.

Pred Sensor, special duty engineer who was riding the cab of the troop train said he was sitting on the fireman's seat on the left side of the cab when he saw the truck move slowly across the four-track crossing.

"I thought the driver was one of those fellows who drives up to within a few feet of the track, stops suddenly, then laughs as the locomotive roars by," Sensor said. "I thought that was what the truck driver was going to do," he added. "But instead he kept on crossing the track right in front of us."

Guenot said that upon approaching the crossing he brought his truck to a stop and that his daughter, Mrs. McClusick, said "It's all right, dad." He put the truck into third gear (one gear below high) and started over. He knew nothing of the train's approach until his daughter cried out the warning, he said.

Guenot said he didn't hear any whistle, heard no bells and that if his daughter hadn't shouted he never would have seen the train.

All other witnesses, with the exception of one, testified that the train whistled for the brickyard crossing, and some of the witnesses said the whistle sounded a short blast just before the crash. It was brought out that some time ago residents of Milesburg and Boggs township petitioned the railroad to have trains whistle at only one crossing in Milesburg, instead of at all crossings on the Bald Eagle Valley Branch in that community. In accordance with the petition, west-bound trains sound their whistles only for the brickyard crossing at the eastern end of the town.

Members of the Coroner's jury were Karl E. Kuse, Charles Coble and James R. Hughes, all of Bellefonte, and Allen Weaver, George Newman and M. E. Flynn, all of Milesburg.

Witnesses were as follows: George I. Seeger, of Milesburg, operator of the railroad tower about 150 feet west of the Kohlbecker crossing; Rev. William A. Snyder, of Milesburg, who halted at the Weaver crossing west of the Kohl-

becker crossing just in time to see Guenot's truck hurtling through the air; Rev. Hewes Phillips, of Milesburg, who was at the Earl Peters home within a stone's throw of the crossing at the time; Mrs. Phillips, who was visiting at the Miss Levy home opposite the Kohlbecker Hotel; Orlando C. Bryan, of Milesburg, who was working in a house a short distance east of the Kohlbecker Hotel; A. L. Naylor, of Tyrone, fireman of the locomotive; A. W. Anderson, engineer in charge of the locomotive; Thomas A. Kibler, signal maintenance supervisor for the railroad, who was on the tower just west of the crossing, and Mr. Sensor, special duty engineer, and Mr. Guenot.

Fireman Naylor said that from his seat on the left side of the cab he saw the truck start over the crossing toward the hotel, but that since it was traveling only 4 or 5 miles an hour, he thought little of it, since application of its brakes would have brought it to a dead stop. When he saw the truck continue on, Naylor said, he yelled at the engineer to stop.

(Continued from page one) the enemy pocketed in this area contributed toward effecting the annihilation of the enemy.

On one occasion, Lieutenant Baird in a foxhole with another officer from his company, held their fire, when charged by six of the enemy, until the enemy were within a few yards of their position. By this delay in opening fire and by use of hand grenades three of the enemy were killed and three were taken as prisoners, wounded.

Lieutenant Baird is a law partner of Thompson and Baird, of Phillipsburg. His wife and little daughter, Martha, reside in Phillipsburg.
