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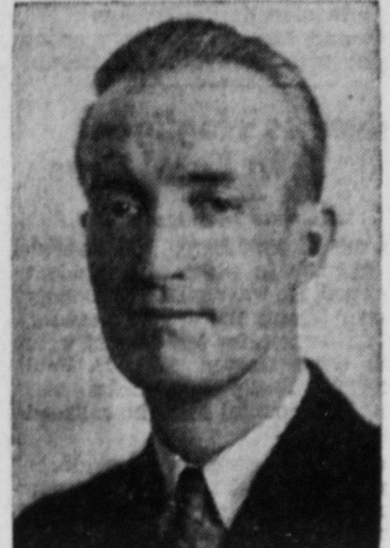
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Announces For County Treasurer

Leslie Thomas, Bellefonte Merchant and Councilman, Seeks Office



Another newcomer in Centre county politics made his appearance last week when W. Leslie Thomas, Bellefonte merchant and Councilman, announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for the office of County Treasurer.

Mr. Thomas is quite well known to the voters of Bellefonte borough, since he has been a successful candidate for offices in the west ward on several occasions. But his announcement for the County Treasurership marks his first venture into the county political field.

Mr. Thomas is a son of Joseph D. and Carrie J. Fisher Thomas and was born in Boggs township March 9, 1904. While he was still an infant the family moved to Bellefonte, residing here since that time. Leslie attended the local school and was graduated from the Bellefonte High School in the class of 1923. For several years he was employed as an inspector and rotary kiln operator at the American Lime and Stone Company plant, leaving that employment to enter his father's store, where he is at the present time.

On April 2, 1928 he was united in marriage with Miss Helen Elizabeth Schmitz, of Sunbury. There is one daughter, Shirley Adeline, and the family resides on South Thomas street.

Mr. Thomas has taken an active part in local politics for a number of years, although he never has held a remunerative office. He has been a Republican precinct chairman in the west ward for the past ten years and is serving his second term as Councilman from that ward.

Council recognized his abilities by naming him chairman of the important water committee and in addition he has been secretary of the Bellefonte Borough Authority since its organization five years ago. He was chairman of the Borough Police Civil Service Commission until the commission was discontinued several years ago.

He is a member of the United Brethren church and the Bellefonte Lodge of Masons. In his high school days he took an active part in athletics and since then has continued his interest in sports. He is an ardent hunter and fisherman and maintains a lively interest in the activities of local sportsmen's organizations.

In announcing his candidacy Mr. Thomas made the following statement: "I am seeking the office of Treasurer of Centre County with the intention of conducting the office in an efficient and business-like manner if elected. Because of the present restriction on driving my chances of meeting the Republican voters in the county are very slim, but I hope to make their acquaintance by some means or other before the September Primary. If not I can assure you that if nominated and elected I will conduct my office in a courteous and efficient manner." (Pol. Adv.)

of February of this year that the supplies finally arrived at the hospital.

"During this time, especially after the first of April 1942, prices had almost doubled on all of this equipment, but the Veterans' Club of Bellefonte undertook to be responsible for the increased price and expected to put on a drive among the other organizations of the county to cover these increased costs.

"Meanwhile, during the past year, owing to recent discoveries in medical science, it was reported that plasma containers could now be obtained by the hospital for the sum of \$2.75 each, or at a less cost than the hospital figured it could obtain plasma with its own machinery.

"Facing these facts, representatives of these organizations met on March 16th and decided to return the blood bank supplies which had arrived at the hospital about a month ago.

"At this meeting it was announced that the Board of Trustees of the Centre County Hospital were very appreciative of the offer which had been made by the various organizations when they indicated a desire to purchase this equipment for the hospital, and that the trustees were desirous at this time of expressing their appreciation and hoping that at some future time some other needed equipment in the hospital may be purchased by them.
