MRS. LAURA WAGNER

Mrs. Laura Wagner, former State College resident, died at the Lewis-town Hospital at 8:15 p. m. Friday, March 26, 1943. Mrs. Wagner went to State College a number of years ago and lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Messmer. After their deaths, she moved to Stormtown where she stayed until the beginning of her last illness. She is survived by a son, Russell, a daughter, Ruby, and three grandchildren. Funeral services were held in the Grace Evangelical church, Lewis-town, Monday afternoon.

FRANK R. SMITH

Frank R. "Bucky" Smith, veteran of World War I and well known resident of Bellefonte, died suddenly of a heart attack at 12:45 o'clock Monday noon, March 29, 1943, while at his post of duty as steward at the Undine fire house, East Bishop street. Mr. Smith had not been in good health for several weeks, but took part in the Undine St. Patrick's Day minstrel show and performed

his usual duties about the Undine home. Deceased, who served with the U. S. forces in France during World War I, was a member of the American Legion, Bellefonte. He was a son of Jacob P. and Hannah Wilson Smith and was born in Bellefonte on November 7, 1887, making his age at time of death 55 years, 4 months and 22 days. His wife, the former Pearl Powers, of Bellefonte, preceded him in death. Surviving in addition to a daughter, Frances, of Scotland, Pa., are five brothers and one sister, namely: A. C. Smith, W. H. Smith, and Morton Smith, all of Bellefonte; Gilbert Smith, of Bellefonte; E. D. Clarence Smith, of Johnstown; Mrs. J. W. White, State College, and Mrs. S. C. Miller, of Philadelphia. In his younger days Mr. Smith was employed in the tailoring shop conducted for many years by his brother, A. C. Smith. Later he served as steward at the Legion home, and more lately at the Undine home. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the home of the brother, W. H. Smith, of

North Spring street, with Rev. Harry C. Stenger, Jr., pastor of the Methodist church officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery.

JOHN H. BARGER

John H. Barger, of Curtin, former operator at the old Curtin Iron Works, died at his home at 5 o'clock Saturday morning, March 27, 1943, after a several months' illness. Mr. Barger was a son of Constance C. and Anna Elizabeth Taylor Barger and was born at Curtin on November 20, 1866, making his age at time of death 76 years, 8 months and 7 days. He was never married. Surviving are the following brothers and sisters: Andrew, of Howard; Mrs. William Adams, of Mt. Eagle; Mrs. H. E. Lutz and Mrs. Alice Gingham, of Meadville, and Mrs. Edward Funk, of Curtin. Funeral services were held at the Curtin Methodist church on Monday morning with Rev. Wallace Cummings officiating. Interment was made in the Curtin cemetery.

DOROTHY MAY MILLER

Dorothy May Miller, of near Howard, died at the Lock Haven Hospital at 4:50 o'clock Sunday afternoon, March 28, 1943, of complications following a three weeks' illness. Deceased was a daughter of Wilson and Hazel Mace Miller and was born in Woodward township,

Clinton county, on December 20, 1926, making her age at time of death 16 years, 3 months and 8 days. Surviving are her parents and these brothers and sisters: Howard and Ray, of near Howard; John and Earl, in the U. S. Army; Floyd, Guy, Mary, Eva, Frances and Relda, all at home. She was a member of the Summit Hill church. Short funeral services will be held at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon, followed by services at the Summit Hill church at 1:30 o'clock, with Rev. Henry Miller of Mackeysville, officiating. Interment will be made in the Summit Hill cemetery.

WILLIAM WINFIELD DENISON

William Winfield Denison, of Pennsylvania Furnace, a resident of the Misonoke Home, Elizabethtown since May 1940, died there Saturday morning, March 27, 1943. Mr. Denison was born in Norfolk, Va., on August 4, 1864, and was 78 years old. The last member of his family, Mr. Denison was a member of the Galesburg Lutheran church and the State College Lodge No. 700, F. and A. M. Funeral services were held at the Galesburg Lutheran church Tuesday afternoon, with Rev. J. N. Fisher officiating. Interment was made in Galesburg cemetery.

EDMUND PRUNER HAYES

Edmund Pruner Hayes, of East Palestine, Ohio, veteran of World War I, and son of the late Dr. R. G. H. Hayes and Sarah Hoffer Hayes, of Bellefonte, died about 9 o'clock Monday morning, March 29, 1943, in the Veterans' Hospital at Aspinwall, where he had been a patient at various intervals during the past year. Mr. Hayes, who was aged about 55 years, was born in this locality and spent his early life here. He resided in Bellefonte for several years prior to eight or ten years ago when he moved to Ohio. Since then he had been an infrequent visitor to town. The deceased is survived by his second wife, two brothers, Thomas, now residing at Salona, and John, of New City, and a sister, Ellen, residing in Florida. During his active life he was a representative of a Pittsburgh manufacturing concern, and was recognized as an authority on bridges. Funeral services are to be held in East Palestine, Ohio, with interment in that city.
