HARRY OSWALT
Harry Oswalt, of Snow Shoe, died at the Centre County Home, Bellefonte, Sunday morning, April 4, 1943, after an illness with a heart condition. He was admitted to the home last Friday evening. Deceased was a son of William and Margaret Hoover Oswalt and was born at Snow Shoe on April 4, 1874, his death occurring on his 69th birthday. He was never married. The sole survivors are a sister residing in Indiana, Pa., and a brother living in Altoona. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Johnson Funeral Home in Snow Shoe, with the Rev. Ralph Schlabig, pastor of the Snow Shoe Methodist church officiating. Interment was made in the Askey cemetery, Snow Shoe.

MRS. EDWARD COAKLEY
Mrs. America Coakley, wife of Edward Coakley, of Yarnell, died at 3:20 o'clock Monday morning, April 5, 1943, at the Centre County Hospital where she had been a patient for three weeks. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Wetzer Memorial chapel, Milesburg, with Rev. R. H. Courtney, of Runville, officiating. Interment was made in the Advent cemetery.

Mrs. Mary Dixon, of Snow Shoe, died at her home there at 6:30 o'clock last Thursday evening, April 1, 1943, after a two weeks illness with a heart ailment. The deceased was a daughter of Robert and Gene Halloway Park and was born in Scotland on May 5, 1870, making her age at time of death 72 years, 10 months and 26 days. Her husband, Adam, preceded her in death. Surviving are these children: Alexander, of Snow Shoe; Robert, with the U. S. Army at Ft. Funeral services were held at the late home Sunday afternoon with Rev. Ralph Schlabig, pastor of the Snow Shoe Methodist church officiating. Interment was made in the Askey cemetery, near Moshannon.

Funeral services will be held at 4 o'clock this Thursday afternoon at the Pine Glen Methodist church, with Rev. Ralph Schlabig officiating. Interment will be made in the Advent cemetery, Pine Glen.

Davis, of St. John's Episcopal church, officiating. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.
