As were distributed at this time last season, there may be a last minute rush for fishing permits, but chances are you'll be able to find plenty of creel room along the streams today.

The fish, however, seem to be getting their share of the breaks as the eve of the 1943 season approached. Cold rains and low temperatures during the past week have done nothing to put trout in the mood for breaking their gills to catch flies hovering over the water. They're more apt to hang close to the bottom, near the banks, looking for stray anglerworms which have been washed into the streams by rain. Or they may take a fancy to chasing minnows through the murky waters.

For the waters of local streams are in an in-between condition. They're not running chocolate brown, nor are they crystal clear. Spring Creek has the color of old straw, and its temperature is sufficient to freeze the hopes of even the hardiest of anglers.

As the fishing season is about to open, we can't help thinking of some of the perennial first-day-ers who'll be doing no angling today.

There's Eddie Nelson, who'd never touch a line all season if some mischance kept him from going out the first day. He's in the Army in Lincoln, Nebraska. There's Jim Bower, who always had a pair of self-cooked fried eggs before he started out the first day. Last we heard of Jim he was headed for a berth in the Merchant Marine—on a supply route to some battlefield.

Then there was Dr. Paul Cornman, now with the army in California. Jim Leitzell was another one who, although he never could produce many fish at the close of April 15, could always tell a tale that left you gasping. Jim's in the army in Ardmore, Oklahoma.

A U. S. Navy cruiser will visit Bellefonte Saturday, April 17, to enlist men in the Sea-Bees, construction battalion of the Navy.

To Speak on 'Liquor and War' Tonight

'Liquor and War' will be the topic of an address to be delivered by Doctor D. Leigh Colvin of New York City, at the Methodist church, Bellefonte, on Thursday, April 15 at 7:30 p. m.

Doctor Colvin was a captain in the World War, specially assigned to the duty of building morale among the soldiers. He is one of the best informed men on the liquor problem, and the author of the book "History of Prohibition in the United States."

His appearance here is a part of a general plan to inform the public concerning liquor conditions surrounding the army camps and in war industries. In order that both soldiers and civilians may be protected from exploitation by gambling, liquor and vice interests.
