IN NEW MEXICO

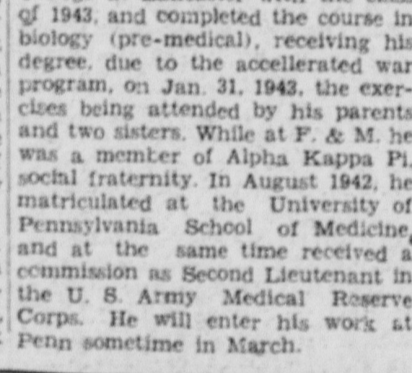
