

Stevenson Seeks Register's Office

Patton Township Resident in First Bid for County Office

Frank K. Stevenson of Patton township has announced his intention of seeking the Republican nomination for Centre County Register of Wills at the September primary election.

The candidate is a son of Mr. and Mrs. George Stevenson of Patton township and was born at Wadswick, November 4, 1901. His father, a well-known farmer, has long been active in Republican politics.

Mr. Stevenson is one of a family of seven children; the other members of the family being John, Emma, Sara, Betty, Catherine and Bobby. He received his education in the public schools of Patton township and upon completion of his education there assumed a position as clerk with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. He resigned two years later to enter the Pennsylvania Business College at Lancaster. After being graduated from the college he accepted a job with the Duro Pump and Engineering Company at Lancaster.

He then took a position with the Swank Hardware company in Johnstown and while working there completed a night school course in banking. Illness forced him to resign his position in Johnstown and he returned to his home where he remained to look after his father's farm and other interests. His draft classification is 4-FH.

Seeking the nomination for the office of Register of Wills is Mr. Stevenson's first attempt at public office although he has been active in Republican politics since returning to Centre county. He is at present a committeeman in his district. In announcing his candidacy Mr. Stevenson stated that if elected he will be in a position to give all of his time to conducting the business of the office and that he will conduct it as though it were his own business. Driving restrictions may prevent his seeing all of the voters in the county but he will make every effort to see as many as possible, he stated.

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not an official one and there is no fee or salary. Council would put a dog catcher to work if it could find someone to take the job. Reporters at the session were unable to determine whether the catcher would be paid by the head for dogs rounded up, or whether he'd be paid by the hour. Mayor Harris thought Council would have better luck in getting a dog catcher if a more euphonious name could be found for the office.

"Nobody wants to be a dog catcher!" the Mayor said. "If you could call it by some other and higher-sounding name, I think you'd get some applicants," he opined.

When the Mayor mentioned rats, conversation was quickly switched to other matters of business.

The borough budget for 1943 was read and finally approved. The budget is set up on a basis of a 13-mill tax rate, the same as for 1942.

Council, exhibiting evidences that its patience in eliminating lime dust is reaching the breaking point, instructed the secretary of Council to send a representative here to go over the entire situation—the implication being that an effort is to be made to declare lime dust a menace to health. It already has been declared a nuisance, and Councilman Walter Eberhart, chairman of the committee in charge of lime dust elimination efforts, declared Monday that in his opinion the presence of lime dust also causes actual destruction of property. The term "lime dust" is a general one covering both lime and coal dust, since both elements are present in the fine dust which blankets the town from the lime plant at Sunnyside.

At the session Councilmen considered briefly the advisability of the borough bringing suit against the American Lime and Stone Company because of lime dust. This suggestion resulted in the decision to call in the Department of Health.

The report of the Health Officer showed 19 health certificates signed; 8 nuisance complaints investigated, and 5 of them corrected; notification of all eating places to comply with sanitary regulations; and the posting of borough dumps. There are four cases of chicken pox in the borough, the report indicated.

The dump at McCoy's, near Pleasant View, was reported to be in bad condition, with much green garbage left on the surface of the ground. Garbage men have been instructed that only clean ashes may be dumped there in the future. The dump at Nigh Bank, east of town, is available for general waste materials, but all foods and edible matter must be covered to prevent rats and insects from reaching it.

The farmers' market, now in winter quarters on West High street, expects to move outdoors on the Diamond sometime after May 15, it was reported.

The police report submitted by Officer John Galasid showed 36 cars tagged for parking violations, 2 large investigations, 3 accident investigations, 5 transients lodged in the lock-up, 22 confidential reports, and \$204.31 received from meters.

The Fire and Police reports showed \$6 from meter fines; \$9 from parking fines, and 41 parking tickets issued.

Council approved the appointment of Wade Witmer and William Monnell as drivers of Logan Fire Company apparatus. The men, recommended by the fire company, will drive Buffalo trucks No. 2 and No. 1, respectively.

Miss Hattie Wagner and Louis Masullo, both of North Spring street, complained that because of recent borough construction surface water now drains onto a lot which they use for gardening purposes, washing large quantities of dirt and ashes on the tract. The matter is to be investigated.

A Mr. Smoyer, of East Beaver street, through a member of Council, complained that ashes and dirt near his property are washed over his land. This matter also is to be investigated.

Philip Saylor, borough manager, was granted a salary increase of \$15 a month.

\$600 Damage In Crash Near Lemont

Two cars were badly damaged and one person was injured in a collision of two cars, at the Lemont intersection about 10:35 o'clock Sunday night.
Linton Sprout, 46, of State College, driver of one of the machines, suffered a laceration of the head and a severe laceration of the tongue when his car veered off the road, ran down an 8-foot embankment and came to rest on its wheels.

Sprout was traveling from State College to Bellefonte, and a machine driven by Clarence E. Weaver, 16, of Lemont, was proceeding in the opposite direction at the time. It is believed the Weaver car turned left off the main highway to enter the road leading to Lemont when the crash resulted.

According to State Motor Police at Pleasant Gap who investigated the accident, neither driver remembered what caused the collision, but both said they were blinded by the headlights of the other car.

The impact threw the Weaver machine to the side of the road, but it remained upright. Police estimated the total damage at \$600, and the Sprout machine was declared to be practically demolished.

Weaver and two companions, Harry Hassinger, 16, and Harold Green, both of State College, escaped injury. Sprout was the sole occupant of his car.

In the general borough fund, Council estimates total revenue this year of \$50,387.62 as compared with \$50,017.45 actually received last year. The actual receipts for 1942 and estimated receipts for 1943 are shown below:

Most of the difference in the two figures is accounted for in the balance at the beginning of the respective years. In 1942 the balance carried over from the previous year was \$7,690.25. This year's balance is \$7,624.61.

Similarly, the balance at the end of this year is expected to be considerably greater than at the beginning of the year. The \$7,624.61 balance as of Jan. 1, 1943, is expected to grow to \$8,342.27 by the end of the year.

The sinking fund is a more or less "closed" account which operates on an almost predictable schedule from year to year.

Nurse Commissioned In Air Corps Service

Miss Nellie Neal, of Altoona, for the past ten years a member of the nursing staff at the Centre County Hospital, has enlisted in the Reserve Nurses Corps of the U. S. Army Air Force and has been selected to report for duty at Greenville Army Air Base, Greenville, S. C., on May 10. She has been commissioned a second lieutenant.

Miss Neal, daughter of Samuel W. Neal, of Altoona, came to the local hospital as a student nurse in 1933 and was a member of the last class of nurses to be graduated at that institution before the Nurses' Training School was discontinued. Since then she has been a general duty nurse there.

She expects to terminate her duties at the hospital today and will go to Altoona to spend several days with relatives before going to Greenville, with her enlistment, six members of the Neal family are now in the armed forces. Five of her brothers are in various branches of the service, one of them being stationed in Iran, and another in Iceland. Three are stationed in the United States.

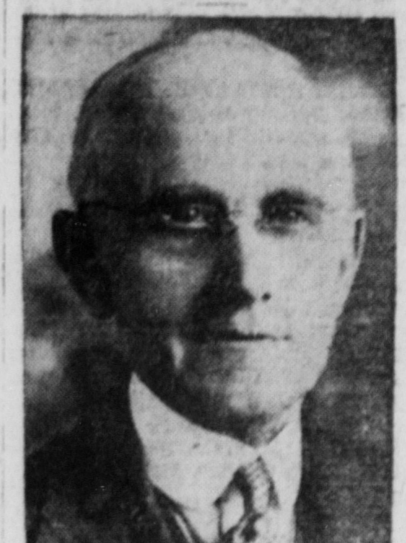
Dull Buttons. If buttons on a garment have become dull from repeated washings, try using a colorless nail polish on them.

William H. Brown Seeks Co. Office

Local Resident Announces For Commissioner on Republican Ticket



William H. Brown, of Bellefonte borough, known to the many residents of the county as Bill, hereby announces his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Commissioner of Centre county, subject to the will of the Republican voters of the county.

Also served as Secretary and Treasurer of the Elks Club for a period of years, and in each instance was forced to devise an accounting system, as well as to attend to the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars. At the present time he is a Justice of the Peace in the borough of Bellefonte.

He served for a number of years in the National Guard, rose to rank of Captain of Infantry, transferred to Cavalry, organized and was Captain of Centre county's first Troop of Cavalry, from which he resigned in 1915 to devote all his time to the Recorder of Deeds office. He was the second Republican Recorder of Deeds ever to be elected in this county and on the first full Republican ticket ever to be elected, only two of whom are still living.

Although holding an office in 1917, during the World War, he could not stay out, enlisted as a private and was sent to Fort Niagara Training Center, where he was taken sick and was in the hospital for some time, from where he was discharged on physical disability.

His personal experience as a former soldier, also as your former Recorder of Deeds, as well as his experience with the hospital has taught him to meet people pleasantly and yet how to protect the interest he is in charge of.
