(Continued from page one) led the Bellefonte troop when that unit was sent to Ireland last August, remained with the troop in January when it was transferred to England. He has been sent back to the U. S. to undergo officers' training at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma. Before departing for that camp he will spend a ten-day furlough here. Sgt. Bernard Yeager, of Moshannon, a member of the local troop, also was sent home from England to undergo officers' training at Ft. Sill. Sgt. Hoffer has visited London and many other English cities. He declares that the present defenses of the Island are strong and that the morale of the people is excellent. "The English have plenty of courage," he declared. Hoffer said there is some feeling against American soldiers in some parts of England, but explained that the feeling probably arises from the fact that American soldiers are paid about four times as much as the British and therefore are objects of some envy on the part of the English soldiers and citizens. The progressive business of the future will be operated for the benefit of three classes, stockholders, employees and the public. If this is general, the capitalist system has nothing to fear from Communism or any other ism.
