Corporal Estright, son of the late Henry C. Estright and Mrs. Sarah Est-light of Milesburg, has successfully passed all qualifications for the paratroopers and is awaiting his call to that branch of the service which he expects to be in soon.

Corporal Estright is now stationed at Camp Forrest, Tenn. He has trained with the 318th Infantry, the 318th Infantry Cannon Co., the Ordnance 780; at the first Ranger school in the country, and the second Army Ranger school at Camp Forrest.

For a time he was employed as an instructor in the school in hand-to-hand combat and bayonet. He is now with the 314th P. A. for special training.

Corporal Estright's outfit was chosen to fire the inspecting gun salute for President Roosevelt on his recent tour of their camp. His last visit here was on March 15, 1943, when he was called home by the accidental death of his father.

Corporal Estright is a graduate of the Bellefonte High School, class of '39. He was united in marriage last June to the former Miss Esther Teaman, of Bellefonte.

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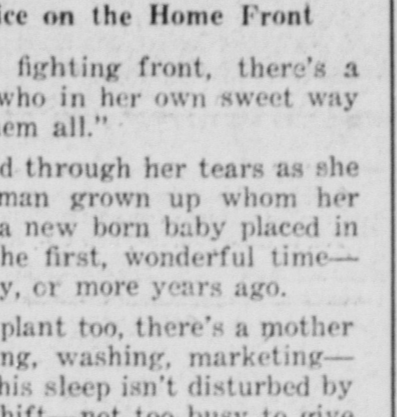
