Pvt. Broderick Dies

been seriously wounded. A later message revealed that his recovery as of April 4 was "not proceeding satisfactorily."

But subsequent letters, one written by a nurse at the hospital, revealed that his condition then was satisfactory. Another letter, written April 15 by the Catholic chaplain at the hospital, reported that he saw Pvt. Broderick every day, and that there was no cause for worry over his condition. He described physicians as being well pleased with the progress he was making and added that the patient was being well cared for in a well-equipped and ideally located hospital. The chaplain expressed belief that Pvt. Broderick would be sent to the United States as soon as he was able to stand the trip.

The next letter received by the family was one written April 17 by "Bub" himself. It read: "Dear Polks: For several weeks I have been trying to write but I have been in so much pain that it has been impossible. I was hit by a German 88 which caused a compound fracture of my left leg and also a very bad wound in the same leg. I was rushed 15 miles through no man's land to a hospital. I was treated there and later down to the British 96th General Hospital.

"I have been in this hospital under British doctors and Sisters. They have taken very, very good care of me. Everybody says I am improving every day. "So much for now, will write more later. Love Bub."

Pvt. Broderick, a nephew of J. Clarence Hamilton, of Bellefonte, entered the Army in June 1942 after refusing deferment. Less than six months later he was with other American troops which stormed the coast of Africa.

He attended the State College High School, and was graduated from Penn State in forestry in 1939. During the first two years of his college career at the Mt. Alto unit of Penn State he was active in basketball and baseball.

After graduation he was employed in the Penn State Forestry Department and later became a production clerk in the main offices of the Glenn L. Martin Aircraft Corporation in Baltimore, Md.

He was in that work when he enlisted in the service, after turning down an opportunity for occupational deferment.

John Joseph Broderick was born in Bellefonte on July 4, 1917, and in addition to his parents he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Anne Broderick McNichol, of Pittston, wife of George P. McNichol, formerly of Bellefonte. Deceased was a member of Our Lady of Victory Catholic church, State College.

Monday of this week, Mrs. Broderick received a letter from Father Snelgrove, British chaplain at the hospital. The letter was written ten days before Broderick died, and in it Father Snelgrove reported that the patient was quite weak, but that he saw him daily and talked frequently with him. He added that the case was being handled by a Major Caldwell, widely known American orthopedic surgeon who is on duty in North Africa, and that everything was being done for him. The chaplain commended Broderick's fine christian character and reported that he was receiving all the spiritual aid of the church.
