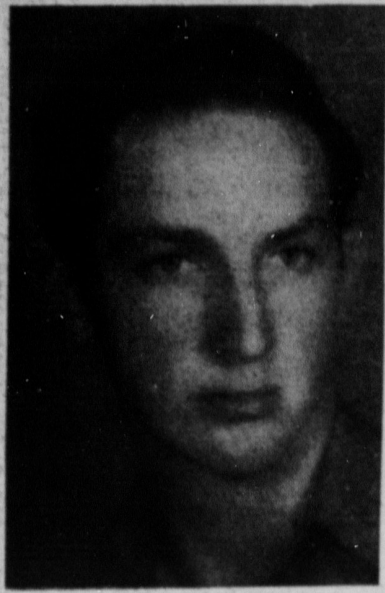


In The Solomon's

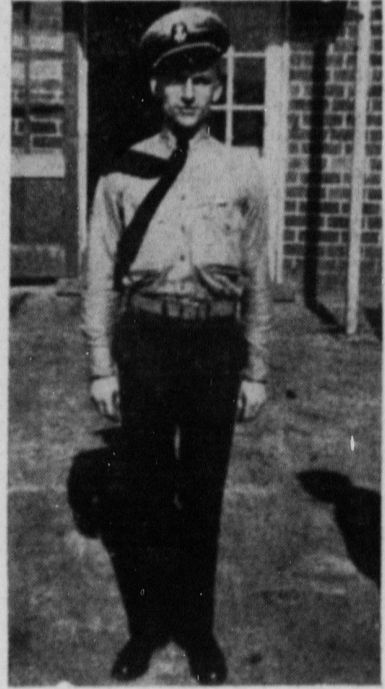


Corp. G. Harrison Walker

He states that it is so terribly hot, 120 degrees, that the American soldiers have been taken to the mountains for two weeks.

Pilot Writes Home

In a letter written to his parents on June 1 from somewhere in the Mediterranean area, 1st Lt. A. R. Warnock Jr., of State College, pilot of a Mitchell bomber said: "After brief respite we're quite busy again, night as well as day. Never felt so lonely as I do up there at night, no lights, no nothing. Then comes that short period when all hell breaks loose, search lights blind and ack-ack bursts dazzle. Sure is a good feeling to get back and guzzle a warm cup of coffee and stretch out on a warm bed. Things look bad for Italy now. Glad I'm on top and not underneath. You have no idea of the tremendous air power developing over here."

Continues Flight Training

Aviation Cadet James P.
