Cpl. George Bressler, 22, was inducted into service October 28, 1942. From the reception center at New Cumberland he was sent to Fort McClellan, Ala., for infantry basic training, and then transferred to Fort Jackson, S. C., where he became a part of the Service Troop. Again he was moved, in the same Service Troop, the 104th Cavalry, to Salem, Oregon. He has successfully passed the marksmanship test. Cpl. Bressler was granted a 15-day furlough last April, but his visit home was considerably shortened by the time consumed in traveling to and from his camp. He is a graduate of the Walker Township High School.

Pvt. Paul Andrew Bressler, 18, was inducted into service April 17, 1943. From Cumberland he was sent to Camp Blanding, Fla., to become a member of Co. D, 262nd Infantry. He has spent most of his time in combat training and is rated as an expert marksman, lacking but one point of earning an expert sharpshooter's medal. His record was 92 point average out of the necessary 93. Paul was a junior in Walker Township High School before his induction.

Cpl. Walter T. Bressler, 20, enlisted in the Army Air Force November 11, 1942. From New Cumberland he was sent to Miami, Fla., then to Atlantic City, N. J., and from there to LaGuardia Field, New York, where he attended the Academy of Aeronautics. Graduating from there he attended Case Jones Academy of Aeronautics in New Jersey. After his graduation there he was sent to Roosevelt Field, N. Y., and from there to Willow Run Army Air Base, Ypsilanti, Mich. He has a graduate diploma from there and will soon leave for an undetermined destination. He has successfully passed his test in pistol practice at Willow Run. Cpl. Walter is a graduate of Walker Township High School.

WHEN THE WAR WILL END

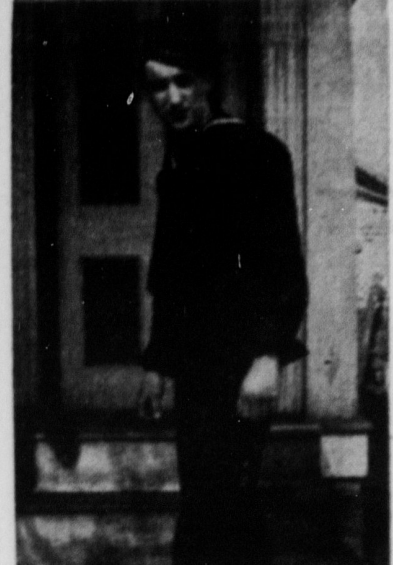

In a recent letter to his mother in Altoona, Staff Sergeant E. Edward Schult, somewhere in North Africa, enclosed a copy of a letter that was printed in the Stars and Stripes, official service men's publication. Believing that it might apply very aptly to some of our own readers we hereby reproduce it. Guadalcanal, 1942. (Delayed) "Dear Family: "It is nice to hear from you after such a long period of time but it is unpleasant to learn of your changed conditions of living which I can readily understand from the change in my own conditions. "It is too bad you are limited in the use of your automobile. I know how it is to walk through miles and miles of swamp and jungles. So I understand. "It is too bad to have your choice of foods limited. I have experienced this, too—except there is no choice here. So I understand. "It is too bad that Willie has to work so many hours at the defense plant. So I can understand. "It is too bad that Willie has so little time for amusement. I am deprived of amusement too. So I can understand. "It is too bad you have to wait in the rain for transportation. I have to wait in the rain too and my transportation and destination is uncertain, too. So I understand. "It is too bad that you are being paid so little for working so hard. I only get a fraction of your pay, so I understand. "Winning this war is hard on all of us. You work long hours and so do I. So I understand. But during those hours I get shot at—as you understand. "Your loving son, Bill"
