



Copperhead Bites Aged Howard Man

(Continued from page one) be kept under refrigeration, and it

is effective in the treatment of the bites of any poisonous snake. The Parrish drug store had not had any calls for the serum for three or four years, the last call being when an employe of a circus showing in Bellefonte was bitten by a snake. Mr. Shenck said that snakes seem to be unusually numerous in the vicinity of his home this year. Last Thursday afternoon, he said, he saw a copperhead attack one of his ung chicks in the chicken yard. By the time Mr. Shenck ran over to the spot, the snake had the chick's head in its mouth. Shenck rescued the chick and killed the snake, which measured nearly three feet in length. The chick did not survive its encounter with the snake. The snake which bit Mr. Shenck was described as being a "young" one which measured only about two feet in length, he said.




