Mammoth Cave-in At Coleville Mine

of it until informed by those on top of the ground.

The cave-in happened about one-third of a mile north of the top of the hill in Coleville, and about a hundred feet or so from a square building in the middle of the hayfield which covers an shaft leading down into the mine.

Immediately after the cave-in was reported, Warner officials visited the scene and placed a 24-hour guard on the premises until the area can be fenced in. They pointed out that all the region immediately around the gigantic hole is dangerous to those unacquainted with the workings underneath and said there is a possibility that further sinkings may occur. They added that no homes or other private property is endangered.

The trees and grass for many feet around the edge of the hole are covered with thin brown dust which rose as the tremendous mass of earth slipped downward.

Probable cause of the sinking, a Warner spokesman said, was that the supporting stone over a large stope about 250 feet under the ground gave way.

The abandoned stope, known as No. 9, was about 50 feet high, 350 feet long and 150 feet wide. When the "roof" of the room gave way under pressure the earth and stone over it dropped down into the room, it was explained.

Under the stope which caved in is another stope which was abandoned about three months ago, and still further down under that level is another stope. There is no danger of the deepest stope caving, an official said, since it consists merely of a tunnel giving access to large stopes further west.

Yesterday afternoon spectators at the edge of the cave-in saw the ground around the edge "working." Small bits of earth and stones from time to time worked loose and fell into the mammoth hole. A giant oak tree which had stood in the west field fell into the hole and was entirely covered. A large cherry tree visible in the bottom of the hole, looked like a young sapling from the top of the ground.

Warner officials said that when the old stope was in operation they had difficulty with surface water and mud, since that these difficulties eventually led to the abandonment of the stope. After the fence had been erected, it was pointed out, drainage ditches will be dug around the hole to carry surface water away and keep it from seeping into the lower levels.

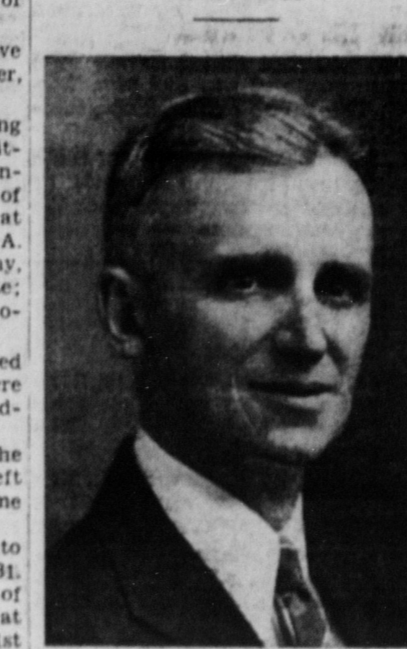

Coroner Sheckler Seeks Re-election

Rounding Out Interesting 4 Years; Has Four Sons in Service

Centre County Coroner Charles Sheckler, Republican, of Milesburg, who last week announced himself as a candidate for re-election to that important office, is rounding out one of the most interesting terms any Centre County Coroner has ever experienced.

Coroner Sheckler had been in office less than three months when he was faced with one of the strangest murders in the history of the county—the death of Rachel Taylor on March 28, 1940. While officialdom was in the midst of investigating the still unsolved murder, Faye Gates, of Mt. Eagle, was found slain near her home, May 5, 1940.

The Coroner played an important role in both cases, and the experience Mr. Sheckler gained in those two instances has stood him in good stead in several other strange deaths in the county since that time.

While the Coroner has been doing his share to keep things under control on the home front, he has four sons who are doing their share with the Army and Navy on the battlefronts. Charles "Budd" Sheckler, as second lieutenant and is to be sent to a replacement center in California. Pvt. Bruce Sheckler is on maneuvers in Tennessee. Seaman Second Class James Sheckler and Seaman Third Class Lynn Sheckler are serving in the Navy.

2 eggs
1-2 flour
1-2 teaspoon melted butter
1 teaspoon soda
1-2 teaspoon salt

C. Roy Held Seeks Sheriff's Office

Madisonburg Republican Candidate Has Had 20 Years' Police Experience

C. Roy Held, Madisonburg, announces his candidacy for the Republican nomination to the office of Sheriff. Mr. Held is well qualified for this position. His height is 6 feet, weight 230 pounds. He has had twenty years experience in the enforcement of Federal, State, and municipal laws.

Born in Miles township March 24, 1887, and being a resident there all his life, he received his early education in the Harters public school, Miles township, later attending Millheim High School, after which he worked on farms in Miles township.

In 1917 he secured a position on the Jones & Laughlin police force, Woodlawn, Pa., where he worked until he joined the armed forces of the U. S. in World War I and became a member of the 315th P. A., 89th Division.

While a member of this organization, he served fifty-one days in action in the St. Mihiel-Meuse-Aargonne sector. Upon being discharged he secured a position as guard at the Western Penitentiary, Rockview, where he worked for four years. He then carried the U. S. Mail from Madisonburg to Millheim for a period of three years.

In 1929 Mr. Held secured a Civil Service position with the U. S. Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., as prohibition agent working in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Delaware.

During this time, he attended and graduated from the U. S. Department of Justice, School of Criminal Investigation, Enforcement and Fingerprinting. At the end of the Prohibition era, he secured a position on the police force in Lock Haven, and worked at this position until January 1937, at which time he secured a Civil Service appointment with the Commonwealth of the Pennsylvania Liquor Board as enforcement officer. During this period, he was trained in law enforcement and until January 1, 1942, he was stationed in Punxsutawney.

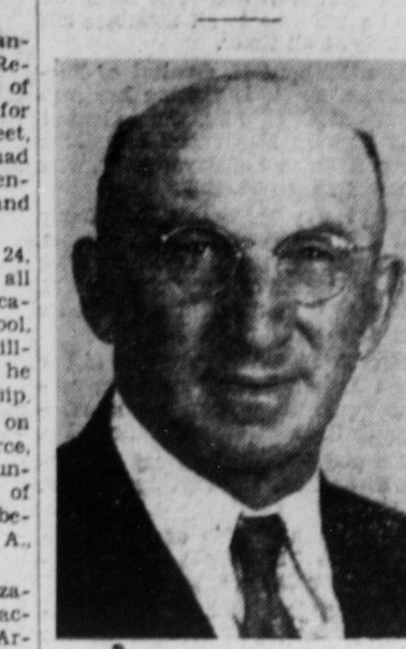
At the present, he is employed by the Piper Aircraft Corporation, Lock Haven. His family consists of his wife, formerly Grace R. Zettle, and one son, Kenneth, who joined the armed forces July 19, 1942.

Mr. Held had never been interested in politics and only now enters the political field because he feels his wide experience in criminal investigation and law enforcement qualifies him to perform the duties and assume the responsibilities of this highly important office during war time.
