Mrs. Kezia M. Twitmire, widow of Dr. T. C. Twitmire, who made her home with a daughter, Mrs. Samuel W. Goodman, in Juniata, died Thursday morning, July 15, 1943, at 7:45 o'clock, after an extended illness. She was born May 13, 1869, in Clearfield county, a daughter of Levi and Mary (Dunlap) Rowles. Her husband, Milesburg native, who practiced in Blair and Clearfield counties, died in 1920. Mrs. Twitmire was a member of the Juniata Presbyterian church. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. S. W. Goodman, Juniata, and Mrs. James Wallace, of Milesburg; five brothers, McClellan Rowles and Taylor Rowles, both of Clearfield; J. F. Rowles, Olanta; D. P. Rowles and Clayton Rowles, both of Seattle, Wash.; one sister, Mrs. James Thornburn, Glen Ritchey; 11 grandchildren, and 6 great-grandchildren.

JACOB J. SHIRK

Jacob J. Shirk, former employe of the Bellefonte Borough, died at 4:45 o'clock Saturday afternoon, July 17, 1943, at his home on South Spring street, Bellefonte, after a week's illness. He was a son of Joseph and Eliza Simmons Shirk and was born near Bellefonte on November 28, 1860, making his age at time of death 82 years, 7 months and 29 days. Mr. Shirk was employed for a number of years at the Valentine Furnace, remaining there until the furnace was discontinued. He then entered the employ of Bellefonte Borough as a truck driver. Jacobs, Bellefonte, officiating. Interment was made in the Sunnyside cemetery, Bellefonte.
