Dry Cure for Preserving Meat
For 100 pounds of meat, use 8 pounds of salt, 3 ounces of salt peter, and 3 pounds of sugar (brown preferred). Mix the ingredients thoroughly and rub half of the mixture on the meat. Pack the meat in oak barrels or large stone jars, with the skin side down except for the top layer. After seven days, re-pack the meat and rub on the other half of the mixture. Allow the meat to cure for two or three days per pound per piece, depending upon the weight. Wash and hang in the smokehouse.

Best Sheltered Port
Port Lyauyte, This modern city of 20,000 people lies 12 miles up the Sebou river from the Atlantic, about 100 miles south of Gibraltar. Now the second-busiest and best-sheltered port of Morocco, Port Lyauyte did not exist before 1913. Marshal Lyauyte founded it, calling it Kenitra, and shortly before his death it was renamed in his honor. In addition to regular service from its airport, the port has electric railway and highway connections with Casablanca, Fez, and Meknes.

The Accordion in 1829
The accordion was invented by Damian of Vienna in 1829. The freed on which it is based had been known for hundreds of years in Asia but it was not introduced into Europe until near the end of the 18th century. The chromatic accordion first was presented on the vaudeville stage in 1905 and a few years later the accordion with the instrument keyboard was popularized in this country.

YOUR HEALTH

Never poke your ear with anything except your elbow. Good advice. Young children have a natural inclination to stuff foreign bodies into the ears, nose and throat. Foreign bodies in the outer ear canal are sometimes pushed further back into the middle ear by clumsy efforts to remove them. Insistent attempts to remove an object from the ear of a struggling child too often results in damage to the ear. The walls of the ear canal become swollen. The foreign body is held in place even more securely. Added manipulation in attempts at removal only aggravate the damage.

A radical mastoid operation was the ultimate result of this gesture. Foreign bodies should be skillfully removed from the ear. Forceful methods only increase the damage and add to the child's fears. Best results are obtained by simple procedures. DO YOU KNOW Bait is so scarce and valuable in Ethiopia that bars of it are used as money in some parts of the country and special sections of the markets are set aside for the important salt merchants. Outmeal is a good meat stretcher. Use it uncooked as you would cracker crumbs—all the binding material in meat loaves, croquettes, and patties.
