the ear. Dry Cure for Preserving Meat For 100 pounds of meat, use 8 come swollen. pounds of salt, 3 ounces of salt peter, and 3 pounds of sugar (brown even more securely, preferred). Mix the ingredients thoroughly and rub half of the mixture on the meat. Pack the meat in oak barrels or large stone jars, with the skin side down except for the top layer. After seven days, repack the meat and rub on the other half of the mixture. Allow the meat to cure for two or three days per pound per piece, depending upon the weight. Wash and hang in the smokehouse.


